Cancer Campaign Opened Last Night In Summerside

A two-day campaign for funds in Summerside by the Canadian Cancer Society was opened with a dinner for workers last evening at the Olympia Restaurant.

Dr. Vincent Grant, Summerside chairman, presided at the meeting which was addressed by Mayor J.F. Arnett and Dr. Henry Moyse, director of the Prince County cancer clinic.

Mayor Arnett said it was a privilege for him to be present and take part in the opening of the cancer campaign. He referred to the objectives of the Canadian Cancer Society as research, education and welfare. He said that

number of pertinent questions were asked and replied to.

Hon. Mr. Barbour reviewed various election issues and dwelt on the trade policies of the two main parties to show that there have always been better times under Liberal administrations.

Mr. Phillips said that George Dray reminded him of R.B. Bennett in the variety of promises that he is making but said that he did not think that Dray would have the same success on election day as his predecessor had.

he did not consider it necessary to remind those present of the importance of this drive. Summerside always responds generously and he felt the people would back up this most important campaign.

Dr. Moyse said that of the 423 cases listed on the records of the operating room of the Prince County Hospital since the first of the year, 20 were for cancer. People are going to their doctors much earlier than previously, he said, due largely to the propaganda of the Canadian Cancer Society. Many people who come early are being cured, he said.

Dr. Moyse explained the work of the cancer clinic and said that a person suspected of having cancer and referred to the clinic will have the benefit of two consultants and all treatment except the hospital room will be paid for by the Department of Health and Welfare.

Mr. J.P. McInnis, executive secretary of the Society congratulated the workers for turning out on such a disagreeable night and he said that their efforts were for the cause of cancer control. He stressed that cancer can be cured in its early stages by means of surgery, X-ray and radium. He told them that everything they do in this drive will help to save lives.

Mr. Grant gave instructions to the canvassers on the proper way of filling out the receipts. The division commanders for this campaign are Messrs William Fridgen, A.S. Hopkins, Stewart Mullins and Harold McIver. - S

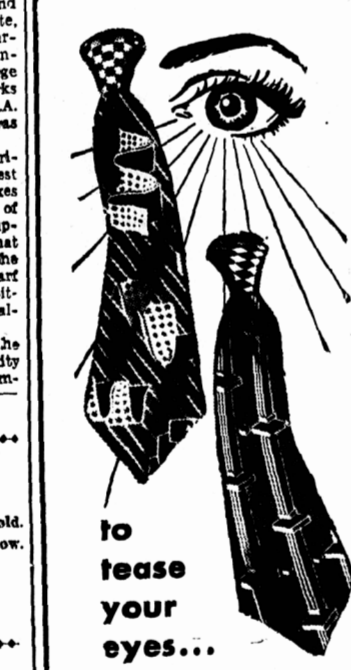
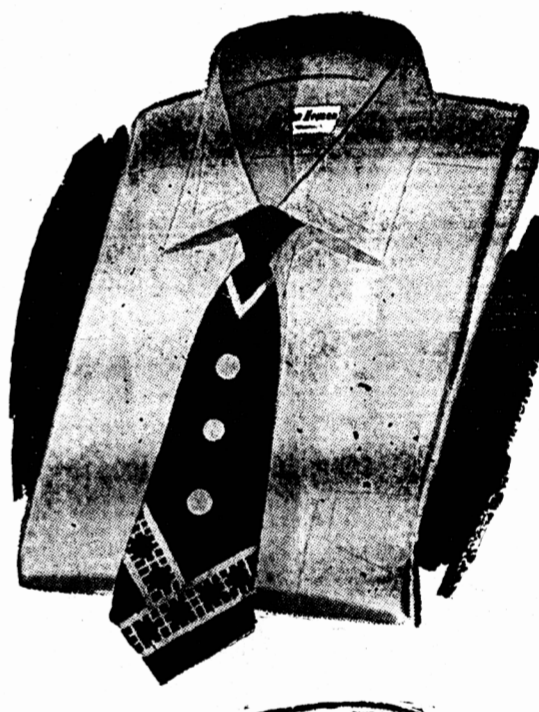

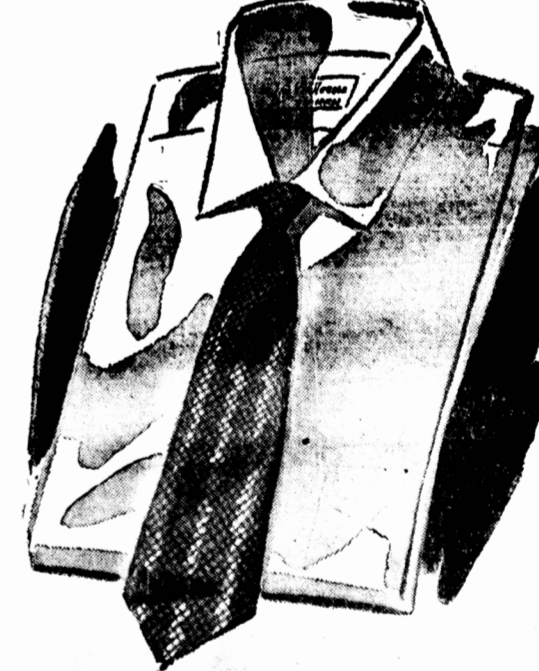
