REV. DR. GANDIER ADDRESSES PRESBYTERIAN GEN. ASSEMBLY

Now Convened at Owen Sound—Retiring Moderator Speaks Eloquenty on Great Question of Church Union.

OWEN SOUND, Ont., June 4.—"However seriously some of us may differ on questions of practical Church politics, all will agree that the primary need of the hour is not better organization, or another committee, or a new society to promote some special reform, or even Church Union itself as an outward act, but a new breath from God to come as a breeze from the hills and sweep through our stagnant lives, a new kindling of heaven's fire upon altars that are cold and bare, a love that is not of earth to fill with new warmth the souls of men."

In the foregoing words did Rev. Dr. Alfred Gandier, D. D., LL.D., retiring Moderator of the Presbyterian General Assembly, refer tonight at the opening of his valedictory address, to the great question which is so prominently in the minds of the clergymen and lay delegates to the Assembly now in convocation here.

Dr. Gandier based his remarks on Luke 1, verse 17: "A People Prepared for the Lord." His sermon proceeded as follows:—

"John the Baptist saw this to be the need of his day. The religious and moral forces of Judaism seemed to be exhausted. The old national and religious system with which the Kingdom of God had hitherto been identified was disintegrating, and about to collapse in irremediable ruin. The time had come when nothing would avail but the direct intervention of God Himself, that wondrous breaking through of the Kingdom of God into human history for which the saints of old had looked and longed, and which prophets and apocalypticists had pictured in such glorious imagery. Clearly it was his mission to John that no militaristic Messiah sitting upon David's throne, no setting up of new national institutions, no multiplication of rites and ceremonies—even his own significant baptism with water, would suffice. There must be a new spirit from God, a rekindling of the divine fire within the hearts of men, and so, John not merely gave his call to repentance but made the great announcement: 'I indeed baptize you with water unto repentance; but one mightier than I cometh, the latchet of whose sandals I am not worthy to unloose; He shall baptize you with the Holy Ghost and with fire.'

"This great word of John seems to have gripped the mind of Jesus for not only do we hear echoes of it during His ministry but the last words which fell from His lips ere He vanished from the earthly gaze of His disciples were a pledge that in the immediate future this promise of John would be fulfilled in their experience, thus centering in them the hope of the age to come and ushering in the dispensation of the Spirit. John truly baptized with water, but ye shall be baptized with the Holy Ghost not many days hence."

After 2,000 Years.

"Once again after well nigh 2,000 years there is a feeling that the existing order waxeth old and is ready to perish, that old institutions on longer avail and that with-out some spiritual rebirth human life must be renewed."

JAP QUESTION CAUSES ALARM IN BRITAIN

(British United Press)

LONDON, June 4.—The statement made by the Canadian Minister of Immigration in the Commons a few days ago that the Ottawa government is considering the imposition of further restrictions on Japanese immigration into Canada is causing some anxiety in Britain lest such a move should lead to further complications such as are endangering the relations between the United States and Japan.

The Times editorial this morning maintains that the problem of Japanese expansion is not more serious to United States than it is to the British Empire. In further comment the Times regrets the decision of the government not to proceed with the construction of a naval base at Singapore in view of the possibility of further complications developing in the Pacific.

Fellowship With Others.

"But fellowship with Jesus links us in a holy fellowship with all other disciples of Jesus, and therein lies another source of power. Away back in the days of His earthly ministry, when the mystery of His absence had not yet become a burden upon the hearts of His disciples, Jesus had said: 'Where two or three are gathered in my name, there am I in the midst,' and in accordance with that promise, the Pentecostal blessing with its realized presence of the unseen Jesus, came to a little group who habitually met with one accord in one place. When Paul prayed for the Christians at Ephesus that Christ might dwell in their hearts by faith he also prayed that they might be apprehended with all saints and depth of the breadth and length and height and thickness of the love of Christ, which passeth knowledge, that they might be filled with all the fulness of God. It is only when I learn through fellowship with the believing souls of all ages, all lands, and types, what Jesus and His love have meant to them that I begin to realize what Jesus can be to me. In proportion as my fellowship with the saints widens do I enter into the fulness of God and comprehend the love of Jesus. And how we read and mar that one body of Jesus by His big, how can rivalries and divisions! How can the world believe in the oneness of Jesus with the Father, the uniqueness of His religion, and the universality of His salvation, with Christendom divided as it is today, and often times members of the same Church organization jealous of each other, intolerant and working at cross purposes?"

Church Union Must Be Real.

"We thank God for our own Church Union Movement, but brethren let it be real. Let us not be satisfied with any mere organizational or ecclesiastical units. Let us seek to make this Union a coming together in faith and love of those who are prepared to give up personal preferences and out-worn prejudices, and to hold nothing of value save as it can be made to serve the common ends of the Kingdom of God on earth. It is a notable day in the history of Christendom when three great historic Churches are prepared to give up pride and prejudice and domination, and to pour the full riches of their past history and their present experience into the common treasury of the United Church of Jesus for the furtherance of that great redemption to which He sanctified Himself. So new and startling a manifestation of the Spirit of Jesus inevitably arouses opposition from many quarters and does not realize itself without difficulty and struggle, but I am confident that at any cost these Churches will be true to the heavenly vision. In so great an hour, need we wonder if the new wine bursts some of the old wine skins and brings alarm to the timid? Some of us are in and through the Spirit of Jesus at work in this new land in creating new and more adequate forms of Church life and service.

Not Fixed Or Final.

"That suggests our final thought. In any people whom God can use, there must be readiness to respond to new revelations from the Spirit of Jesus. There is no such thing as a fixed and final revelation, and no such thing as a fixed and final form of the Christian Church. Jesus did once for all reveal God in human flesh, but the significance of our Lord's incarnation and sacrifice must ever be interpreted anew, and that is provided for in our

MILLIONS IN LEGAL BATTLE FOR STUDENTS

Church Must Be Free.

"Amid the controversies of the present hour, one thing is clear—at all costs the Church must be free to obey her Lord and follow the leadings of His Spirit. This is a time to assert anew what our Presbyterian forefathers spoke of as the sole headship of Jesus Christ over His Church. Let the decisions of Legislatures and our Courts be what they may, Jesus our Lord shall be Master in His own House and shape the destiny of His Church. The Church is not a static institution founded with fixed and unchangeable forms by a man long since dead. Our Jesus is the Living One, the Coming One, the Leader of His Church into the ever-widening activities of a larger life. Too long and too exclusively have Christians had the backward look, we need now the upward look and the forward look of Olivet and the Great Commission.

"In a letter from an old class mate of mine, the Rev. Dr. F. W. McCallum, for many years mission-ary in Turkey, he describes a Conference when representatives of the ancient Churches of the East, so long static and moribund in the face of an aggressive Mohammedanism, and representatives of all evangelical Churches at work in that near East, met under the leadership of John R. Mott in a Greek Mount of Olives. They spent five days together in fellowship with one another and with Him who on that hill-top vanished from His disciples as they came again as the Universal Christ of the Spirit. Their aim was to turn their faces from the past, with its fixed traditions, wide divisions and bitter controversies, and seek to learn from their Ascended Lord His mind and His mission for them all amid the new needs and opportunities of Moslem lands, shattered by war and waiting in their ignorance to be made by Him whose earthly presence once for all made Palestine a Holy Land.

"It was a noble effort on the part of those Christians, so different in type and heritage, to forget those things which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before, learn the purpose of their Ascended Lord for His Church amid new world conditions. 'May this be for us a mountain top Assembly, where we too forget those things which are behind, harken anew to the Great Commission from the lips of our Ascended Lord, realize anew its significance for the day in which we live, and make our own the all-sufficient promise: 'Lo, I am with you all the days even unto the end of the age.' Then will we be a people prepared for the Lord."

England Suffering From Worst Floods In Years

By his devotion to duty and his keen interest in all that pertains to higher education in this City and Province Mr. Seaman has left an impression not only on the Board but upon many of our young men and women who will long remember him as a kindly and faithful instructor and advisor.

Further resolved that this Board offers to Mr. Seaman their sympathy in having to retire from active work after an experience of fifty six years in the Public Schools of this City and Province, and express the hope that he will be granted a fair measure of the health, so that his great zeal and ripe experience in teaching may still be available to those engaged in the profession of training the young."

Mr. R. H. Rogers M. A., B. C. L., at present Superintendent of Education was appointed to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. Seaman.
