THE PUBLIC LIBRARY

A Memorial to the Lieut. Governor to Set Aside the Legislative Council Chamber for the Purpose of a Museum and Library.

TO HIS HONOR THE LIEUT. GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

The memorial of the undersigned respectfully sheweth. That it is generally recognized as a matter of sound policy to encourage the formation and maintenance of societies devoted to the study of the Natural Sciences and to historical research:

That in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, as well as in the larger provinces of the Dominion the Local Governments have for many years extended assistance to all such societies by providing them with free quarters in the provincial buildings and by money grants.

That in this Province a "Natural History and Antiquarian Society" has been in existence for thirteen years and, though it has had to struggle on unaided the efforts of its members as notably in the case of the late Francis Bain and in others have not been without practical results:

That it is also generally felt that valuable information and records relating to the early history of this Province are yearly being irretrievably lost, that might be secured if adequate encouragement were accorded to those who are desirous of prosecuting research in this department and if provision were made for conserving the results of their efforts.

That, by the munificence of the late Hon. Thos. W. Dodd, the sum of five thousand dollars is now available for the establishment of a Public Library and if the problem of securing a suitable home for it could be solved, there is every reason to believe that its maintenance could be satisfactorily provided for.

In view of these facts your memorialists are of opinion that it would be in the best interests of the Province if a room in the Provincial building were placed at the disposal of those willing to undertake the furtherance of the foregoing objects to be used: (a) as a place of meeting, (b) to enable the "Natural History and Antiquarian Society" to proceed with the formation of a museum for the Province, (c) to encourage the donation of information and records relating to the early history of this Island by rendering it possible to make proper provision for their preservation (d) and to provide for the establishment of a Public Library, the need of which is yearly becoming more sensibly felt, and they are also of opinion that

Through His Excellency the Right Honorable the Earl of Minto K. C. M. G., Governor General of Canada:

Resolved, That the citizens of Summerside in P. E. I., do forward to His Gracious Majesty King Edward VII our sympathy at the sad bereavement sustained by him in the loss of his devoted mother, Her Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria and an expression of our own deep sorrow in the death of our beloved Queen. Further resolved, That we congratulate his Majesty on his accession to the throne and with the rest of his subjects in all parts of the British Empire assure him of our loyalty and devotion. And further resolved, That the Chairman, Richard Hunt, Esq., and the Hon. Judge McLeod be requested to forward this resolution to His Majesty.

THE DEAD QUEEN IN LAST REPOSE

Sleeps Beside the Late Lamented Prince Consort, Albert the Good.

THE SOLEMN RITES AT THE ROYAL MAUSOLEUM

The King and Queen Beside the Coffin—Other Royal Personages Present—Vast Crowds Surround the Scene in Tearful Sorrow—King Edward's Coronation Not to be Delayed—Honors to Queen Alexandra—Natives of India Sing Hymns of Lamentation for the Dead Empress.

THE LAST SOLEMN RITES.

WINDSOR, Feb. 4.—(Special.)—The final rites over the Queen's body were conducted this afternoon and the remains laid to rest in Frogmore mausoleum beside those of the Prince Consort.

KING AND QUEEN BESIDE THE COFFIN.

The King and Queen, Emperor William and others of the Royal Family attended the services beside the coffin this morning.

THE ORDER OF THE PROCESSION.

At 2.45 the choir went to the mausoleum; bells tolled and minute guns fired.

At 2.15 the procession passed out of King George's arch in the following order:

The Queen's Company of Grenadier Guards with arms reversed;

The Governor and Constable of Windsor Castle.

The Duke of Argyll Highlanders and Pipers;

The Royal Servants.

The Band of the Grenadier Guards.

The Bishop of Winchester and Dean of Windsor;

The Lord Chamberlain and Lord Steward.

The gun carriage with coffin supported by the Queen's equerries and household flanked by the same officers as on Saturday.

Following the coffin walked:—

King Edward;

The Duke of Connaught;

Emperor William;

The King of the Belgians and Prince Henry of Prussia.

Great crowds witnessed the service, but only members of the Royal Family were admitted inside the mausoleum where the service was private because of limited space.

The Kings of Portugal, Belgium and Greece attended the ceremony.

THE KING'S CORONATION.

The belief is that the coronation ceremonies will be not long delayed.

HONORS FOR QUEEN ALEXANDRA.

The Emperor has appointed Queen Alexandra, Colonel of the Prussian Regiment

Dragoons of which the late Queen was Honorary Colonel.

GREAT MOURNING IN INDIA.

CALCUTTA, Feb. 4.—(Special.)—Despatches tell of a great gathering of an hundred thousand Hindus in the open air to sing hymns of lamentation for the death of the Queen.
