French Gov't Exceeds terms Of armistice

State Secretary Cordell Hull Replies To French Ambassador

WASHINGTON, May 20—(AP)—Secretary of State Cordell Hull told the French Ambassador in strong language today that the United States is convinced pro-Fascist elements are in supreme control in the Vichy Government and that France has gone beyond the armistice terms in "collaborating with Germany."

This, it was authoritatively reported, was Hull's reaction when the envoy, Gaston Henry-Haye, called at the State Department to seek an explanation of what he termed an "explosion of emotions" in the United States concerning the "collaboration." Henry-Haye contended that Vichy was acting only in accordance with the armistice with Germany and Italy. He also protested against the United States' "unfriendly action" in taking French merchant ships into protective custody.

When the Ambassador requested clarification of the American attitude toward France, State Department sources said, Hull declared that all nations are satisfied the Vichy Government, acting under German compulsion, has exceeded the armistice terms.

The facts already known, it was said in informed quarters, places the burden of correcting that impression—if it is not true—on Vichy. One of the "facts" is understood to be Vichy's acquiescence in the use of Syrian air fields by German planes bent on attacking the British forces in Iraq.

The Vichy Government, it was said, should make clear in some satisfactory way that it is in absolutely good faith in proposing in the future, at least, to keep within the terms of the armistice agreement.

Officials here said further that no satisfactory relations can exist between Vichy and peaceful nations so long as this general impression of coexisting French and German relations continues to exist.

Allege putsch Planned by Chilean Nazis

SANTIAGO, May 20—(AP)—Thirty-two members of the Vanguard organization formerly known as Chile's Nazi Party were held tonight on charges of plotting a second putsch against the government.

The arrests followed a gunplay Friday night in which one radical party delegate was killed and four were wounded when the police said vanguards sought to break up a radical party convention here. Eight women who had been held were released.

Ismael Romero, a vanguardist official, was said by the police to have written to a provincial chief, Edilberto Bizama, and said: "I report to you that the unanimous opinion of the people is that we must again embark on another fifth of September."

It was Sept. 5, 1938, when the present vanguardist leader and deputy, Juan Gonzalez Ven Marces, led the Nazi party putsch against the government of President Arturo Alessandri. It resulted in the execution of 65 Nazis.

Carol, Lupescu Leave Bermuda Enroute to Cuba

HAMILTON, Bermuda, May 19—(CP Cable)—The former King Carol of Rumania and Madame Lupescu left Bermuda today for St. Thomas, Virgin Islands, on the way to their new permanent home in Cuba.

Before leaving here, Carol said they would stay only briefly at St. Thomas. "I'll only be passing through," he said. "There will be a ship waiting there to which I shall transfer to go to Cuba."

He did not identify the ship that would pick up him and his companions at the United States possession.

He and Mme. Lupescu left here on the American liner Acadia. Carol was driven to the ship in the carriage of Governor Sir D. J. C. K. Bernard. Mme. Lupescu went to the pier separately in a private carriage.

They arrived here May 10 from Lisbon, on board the American export liner Excambion.

NEW YORK, May 21—(CP)—Sentimental June weddings are likely to be a bit more expensive than the casual kind, what with lacy veils and diamond rings and multiple bridesmaids, but nobody seems to mind.

About 75 per cent get engagement rings. The engagement ring isn't necessarily expensive. A survey of jewelers shows that about half of all engagement rings are priced at \$50 or less. Only once in five years do the jeweler's find a bridesmaid willing and able to buy a \$10,000 ring.

Wedding rings too, are sentimental once again after about ten years of severity in styling. New ones, made of gold or platinum, are elaborately carved and often set with diamonds. Engagement ring and wedding band often are selected at the same time in related styles and usually the bride helps with the selecting.
