## 17 DEAD IN C.P.R. COLLISION NEAR BRANDON

BRANDON, January 13.—Hidden from sight in clouds of mist and steam, a C. P. R. work-train was yesterday morning struck by an east-bound freight. In the caboose of the work-train a gang of railway workers, all foreigners, was crowded into the caboose of the freight train. Fourteen were killed outright, three were fatally injured and twelve more or less seriously injured. The work-train, which had dumped its load of snow into the river, was backing down the yards, out of which its round stock train was running. Thirty men of the work-train gang had crowded into the warm caboose for the trip back, and no one saw the oncoming freight. As for the freight engineer, his vision was limited by the mist and steam and it was not until the local train was yards of the work-train that he saw the caboose loom out of the fog. The heavy locomotive smashed into one end of the caboose, while a flat car on the other side of it reared up and cut through the other end. The men in the caboose were unable to escape, were either killed or badly injured. The shock scattered bodies around the tracks, and before they could be rescued many had suffered additional injury from frost bite. The temperature was 47 degrees below zero, a biting cold which we create and frost bit in a few minutes. The injured were hurriedly carried into a caboose, run in on the next track, and rushed to the hospital. Here three of them died shortly after admission, and some of the others are in a critical condition. The wreckage included only the caboose and two flat cars, with slight damage to the freight locomotive. No responsibility has yet been placed for the accident. An inquest will be opened to-morrow. The following official statement regarding the Brandon wreck was issued by the C. P. R.: "At five minutes after ten this morning an eastbound freight train, pulling out of Brandon, met a work-train which was backing up into the yards, after having unloaded a quantity of snow, which it had taken from the yards, into the river. The temperature at the time registered 47 below zero. A number of the workmen had taken refuge from the cold in the caboose of the work-train. The impact of the engine partly damaged the caboose, killed Section Foreman Magee and, it is thought twelve others, besides injuring a number. The cause of the accident has not yet been ascertained, as the Conductor of the work-train is among the injured. Traffic was not delayed."

—THE HAPPY PLAIN.— Heaven, said Lady Gregory, was known to the Irish before the coming of the Christian teachers. It was called Tir-nan-Og, "the country of the young" or "the happy plain." Lady Gregory cited some curiously close parallels between the legends describing Tir-nan-Og and the celestial vision of St. John as told in the Revelations. The peasantry still confuse the Heaven of Holy Writ and Tir-nan-Og. There is a universal belief in the supernatural world, whose people are known variously as "the Shee", "the others", "the gentry," and "the fairies." They were a race of immortals always close to humanity, occasionally making themselves visible, and sometimes mocking and at other times helping mortals. Opinion was divided as to whether they were the defeated ancient gods or fallen angels. Sometimes they appeared as little people with green caps, and at other times tall as human beings, but much thinner, and with shining eyes. Lady Gregory recited several instances of old visions by old and utterly illiterate men and women, whose incidents were apparently substantiated by historical and archaeological lore, and she advanced the theory that if these were not pure visions or dreams, they might be the result of what scientists are beginning to call "memory of nature," in which some of the sense of the events and personages of the past hover about a locality and are perceptible to certain sensitive minds.

—THE DEAD COME BACK.— Sir Oliver Lodge's recent statement that he had proved that the spirit survives death and could come back, while creating interest in the world at large, would be no surprise to the people of Connaught, who would say: "We know that the dead live and that they come back. We look for them and are not afraid of them." An old woman who had told of the death of her son, was asked by Lady Gregory if she had seen him yet. "No, not yet," was the answer, "but often the father and I go into the garden at night, thinking that he will come." This belief in the dead returning, says Lady Gregory, takes away much of the fear of death and makes the mourning less acute. Ca-

## IRELAND RETAINS ITS OLD LEGENDS

MONTREAL, January 12.—It was a fascinating glimpse into another world, which was vouchsafed to the large and interested audience which gathered in the ball-room of the Ritz-Carlton, on Saturday night, to listen to the lecture on Irish folklore, delivered by Lady Gregory, dramatist, author and mystic. For an hour Lady Gregory held her hearers' close attention by her recital, in the exquisitely modulated voice and choice English diction, of which she is a mistress, of the quaint and beautiful legends and beliefs of the peasantry, handed down through the centuries and constantly supplemented by their personal experiences in the supernatural, of which Lady Gregory gave numerous instances as taken down by her from the old men of the world.

In opening, Lady Gregory said that fifteen years ago she had declared, in a paper written for the Spectator, that if by some miracle all evidences and remembrances of Christianity were swept out of the world, it would not change the belief of the Irish people in the world invisible, things eternal and the life to come, which she believed had but confirmed her in this opinion. As in the Scriptures it was said that the sons of God walked with the daughters of men, so from earliest times in Ireland there existed the belief that the angels came and talked to the human boys of old, because, as one old man put it, the Fenians were "so nice and respectable." The Irish, Lady Gregory held, had never lost that inner vision which all nations probably possessed in the earlier days of belief. This continuity of vision was shown in the manner in which the legends of the Irish deities were later applied to some of the Christian saints. Thus, the god of Lugh, whose face was so bright that none could look upon it, and who was the protector of poets, found his prototype in St. Columcille, the old man of the world, Gregory that before the end of the world there would be a great war in Ireland, but the valley of St. Columcille would be spared its horrors.

In like manner, Brigit, the Saint of Leinster, was invested with the same qualities as her predecessor, the old woman of the world, whose way was noble and who protected the people. St. Brigit, who is credited with bringing to his death Strongbow, Earl of Pembroke, first English invader of Ireland, is to this day the healer and helper of the Connaught folk. One of the women told Lady Gregory how a little fish in St. Brigit's well had restored her sight. St. Colman, son of Rhinagh, was another potent personage who still appears under various manifestations to his old friends. A little boy left to attend the birds from a whatfield old boy's farm had come and driven all the birds into a barn, so that the lad could sleep without neglecting his duty. "A little gray man," none other than St. Colman, had held a lad's head above water for hours in a deep well. A farmer who had been invited to visit St. Colman's well every year until he grew too feeble was honored by a call from the saint in person.

bins are kept clean at night in case "some poor soul might want to come back," and a light is placed in the window for the first few nights after a funeral in order to guide the wandering spirit. Mothers are always supposed to return to their children, and it is believed that no child thrives so well as the orphan whose mother comes back to suckle it. "Often I call to my mother when I need her," said one woman, "and it's often the dead are troubled with the living."

Long before the Christian dispensation the Irish believed in an intermediate state after death, before the final disposition of the spirit, and in some of the peasantry this belief is connected with the sites of prehistoric forts, which are found in many places. One woman, who had lost five children, said that their spirits were in the old fort nearby, and that two of them had come back to her. The dead are supposed to help the living in various ways. A woman in the West Country, whose gift of healing was so great that the fame of it spread even to the British army in India, was held to have secured it from a little dead brother. The battle which King Arthur saw waged between angels and devils over a chapel in the forest is still fought above the thatched and broken roofs of Connaught, for the dead come back to resist the powers of darkness, who are seeking to take sick relatives. "This was the Martindale, for he saved John," said an old man, the morning after the crisis in a boy's sickness had passed. "I heard his voice last night as they were fighting over the roof."

When reason and logic were elevated to such a high plane by the Greeks, it was thought that they would solve all problems. Reason, however, had apparently reached its limits, and in taking down her fragmentary records of Irish beliefs and experiences, which seemed to be glimpses into the shadows behind the veil of death, Lady Gregory said that she had been actuated by the thought that perhaps intuition was once again to take its place as a force in the world, as in the elder days.

At the conclusion of her lecture, Lady Gregory was presented with two bouquets, in acknowledgments which she thanked those present for "listening so patiently and being such a nice audience."

Yesterday afternoon Lady Gregory had a sleigh-ride around the Mountain, getting her first sight of such winter sports as snowshoeing, bogganing, skeing and bob-sleighing. She left last night for Lewiston, Me.
