THE residence of Mrs. Margaret Loughran, of Auburn, near Fort Augustus, was totally destroyed by fire about noon on Wednesday last. The house was a new one, built at considerable expense only four years ago. What makes the loss doubly regrettable is the fact that the old dwelling was burnt just previous to the time when the new one was erected. It is supposed that the origin of the fire was due to a defective flue. Only a few articles on the first floor were saved. There was no insurance. Mrs. Loughran has now decided to sell her farm.

There will be three chicken fattening stations in the Island this fall, respectively located at Charlottetown, Alberton and Mount Stewart. Mr. Horace Haszard, who so successfully conducted the fattening last season, will again have control of the Charlottetown station. Mr. Henry J. Matthews will fatten in Alberton, and Mr. Geo. C. Douglas, at Mount Stewart. Another large station is being considered in the Belfast district. Besides the stations operated under Government control, several private fatteners will also ship to Great Britain, among whom might be mentioned Mr. Thos. Robertson, of Summerside, Mr. T. B. Woodman, of Alberton, as among the largest. It is expected that over 1,000 first-class birds will be fattened and shipped from the Island to the British market this year. Mr. Hare, the expert who accompanied Prof. Robertson on his recent tour and assisted in establishing the stations, left for the mainland yesterday morning.

Who Pays The Fine?

(St. John Sun.) A correspondent sends a protest against the punishment of a convicted wife-beater by a fine, which was probably paid by the beaten wife. He thinks that the woman should not be fined for allowing herself to be beaten, especially if she could not help it. Our system of punishment for many offences is certainly crude and illogical. There is a woman known to us who sometimes has occasion to go in distress to her friends. Her husband gets drunk once a while and is fined. When he is at work, he earns rather small wages, but with the sum earned by his industrious wife, who takes in washing, the family is maintained. If it were not for the periodical fines, paid out of the small savings from the washing, the woman would be able to buy bread for her children, when she now has to seek help from her friends. The last time she was heard from, the money earned by herself, and put away to buy a barrel of flour, had just been paid in to Judge Ritchie's court. The tired wife and mother did not feel that she owed the city this money. The privilege of knowing that her husband had spent his earnings in drink, and was then incapable of earning any more, was not worth so many hours of hard work over the wash tub. This woman does not know much law, and is not well up in social science generally. She cannot get it out of her head that she is punished sufficiently in the sorrow and shame she endures, and in the loss of her husband's support, without this further fine that she is called upon to pay out of her own hard saved bread money.
