MONCTON, Oct. 24—(By Wire)—A. E. Williams, local manager of the Bank of N. B., died bravely in the Hospital this afternoon, of the murder which he had not been able to prevent. The deceased was a well-known citizen and his death was a great loss to the community.

100 HORSES ARE BURNED IN STABLE

BOSTON, Oct. 22—One hundred horses perished in the fire last night that razed the stables of John H. Winslow, contractor for the city cleaning of Milton, at Granite avenue, East Milton, just across the Neponset River from Adams street, Dorchester.

According to the private sleuths, the young man is the victim of unfortunate circumstances. Pinkertons said the gang of swindlers who had been operating in the Dominion and the Western States obtained a large sum of money on what was apparently legitimate banking transaction and then it turned out that the men were crooks.
