**A VETERAN BLACKSMITH**—Some time ago the Guardian reproduced from a Millinocket, Maine, newspaper a clipping telling of the oldest active blacksmith in that town. The name of this blacksmith was Mr. R. A. MacDonald and he was a native of Prince Edward Island. He had worked as his trade 59 years, twenty of which were spent in Millinocket. Mr. MacDonald is no doubt a reputable citizen and a good blacksmith but had he remained in his native Province he might have made even a higher record for himself. We have in this Province, not many miles from Charlottetown, a blacksmith, Mr. Henry McKenzie, who is in his seventy-eighth year and has worked at his trade since he was fifteen years of age, a period of sixty-two years in all. That his work is not merely staying by his trade is indicated by the fact that he has at present completed and ready for sale the most beautiful and artistic piece of steel in eleven hundred pieces all of which were cut and forged by Mr. MacKenzie during last winter with tools of his own making and with only a helper for striking and chiselling. MacKenzie is the son of the blacksmith who first invented the now famous beater potato digger, and he is keeping up the well earned reputation of his father as well as himself.

fish immigration, repudiating in the slightest degree thoughts of discrimination, in fact, Canada spent \$17 per head to get British immigrants and only 11 cents for people of the Continent. The difficulties in the way of regulations were no greater than required for a passport to Great Britain or in the way of questions as for entrance to the United States. In regard to miners, he spoke of the embarrassing position in which the department was placed. Numerous telegrams were received from municipalities declining to become responsible for the maintenance of these people after the harvest was over. There were also protests from labor unions.

Sir Thomas Glasgow, of Australia, then spoke of Australia, the policy and methods there being much the same as in Canada. Australia wanted to get all the Britishers they could but not faster than immigrants could be absorbed. There was the additional problem of looking after the returned soldiers, which was the first duty. A British member asked two pertinent questions which he regarded as the crux of the whole question:
