LEAVING THE MAGDALENS.—Rev. E. Templeman, who has been in charge of the Anglican Church in the Magdalen Islands for the last seven years is in the city with his family and is about to leave for Kingsley, Richmond, Quebec where he will take the pastorate of a church. The former rector of the Magdalen Rev. Arthur Reeves who has served over four years on overseas duty and recently took a Khaki University (Oxford) scholarship is expected to return shortly. Rev. Mr. Templeman, and family will be greatly missed in the Magdalen. Before leaving, his parishioners made him a presentation of a valuable box of silver cutlery accompanied by an appreciative address. Nearly all the inhabitants were at the boat to bid Mr. and Mrs. Templeman farewell and the scene was one which touched Mr. Templeman very deeply. He reports that times are prosperous in the Magdalen. Mackerel have been exceptionally plentiful and the cod and lobster fishing is also good. The crop prospects are also of the best. In the Lady Evelyn they have a very good boat but as she makes only one trip a week instead of two it is far from satisfactory. It is hoped that before long an improved service both from the standpoint of carrying freight and passenger accommodation will be provided.
