TRUSTEES REPORT.

The receipts for the year were as follows:—Subscriptions and donations, \$1,310.19; Legislative grant, \$500; rent of land (2 years), \$126; interest (including income) from Starr estate, \$2,385.83; church collections, \$66.38; patients' fees, \$9,102.95; nurse fees, \$92.29, which, with the balance of \$1,373.24 on hand at the beginning of the year, make a total of \$14,956.85.

The expenditure on current account shows a considerable increase over previous years, being \$15,220.13. The increases were principally in salaries and provisions. There was also a large amount paid for insurance, which covers a period of three years. The two wings referred to in our last report, the erection of which was rendered possible through the munificent bequest of the late F. Ratchford Starr, are now completed. These provide for a new kitchen, pantries, store-rooms, refrigerator-room, dining-room and covered pass to the nurses' home, also operating theatre, sterilising-room, anaesthetizing room, surgeons' dressing-room, nurses dressing-room, pathological laboratory, and fourteen private rooms with baths, etc.

The old operating theatre is being converted into a maternity ward of four beds with nursery and lying-in room attached.

Charlottetown now possesses one of the best, if not the best, equipped hospitals east of Montreal.

The additions have cost more than the Trustees anticipated, but as the work progressed they resolved to spare no pains or money to get the best procurable, both as regards the building and equipment, feeling that in this way they could best carry out the wishes of the testator.

The total expenditure to date for construction, equipment, etc., amounted to \$21,919.27. Part of this had been raised by the sale of securities which have realised a good price, and other securities will be disposed of as the markets warrant. Included in the equipment is an up-to-date X-ray apparatus, the total cost of which was \$2,059.25.

Three of the new rooms have been furnished by the following persons:—H. J. Cundall, Esq., J. R. Dennis, Esq., and the Trustees of the late Mrs. Catherine McMillan.

The Hospital now contains forty-four beds, furnished, and has a total capacity of fifty-five to sixty.

Five nurses graduated during the year:—Misses Penzie Howard, Annie Damery, Lydia Tupin, Mamie Profit and Myrtle Ross. The schedules annexed give all the statistics of the work done in the Hospital during the year.
