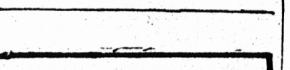

Having to heighten the color of the lash with dabs of grease paint is too much of a nuisance to be performed two or three times daily, the girls think, and they are now wanting their eye-lashes to be colored as permanently as their hair is waved.

The majority of them demand eye-lashes of gold, but others want a rich auburn tint. Black, deep jet black, is another favorite tint, and even green is requested to some of these young women. The eye-lashes as often as not, have to match the painted finger-nails.

Beauty Parlor Warning This vogue is not popular with the beauty specialists, and the Incorporated Guild of Hairdressers, Wigmakers and Perfumers are publicly condemning eye-lash tinting.

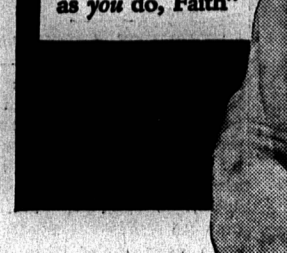

Britain Will Negotiate With Ireland

LONDON, June 29.—(Canadian Press Cable)—While his audience of prominent Conservatives cheered, Stanley Baldwin, acting Prime Minister, made it quite clear in an address at a dinner of the 1900 club this evening that Britain will not negotiate with the Irish free state at the Ottawa Imperial economic conference or anywhere else.

Britain will not enter negotiations with a government which she considers has broken the Anglo-Irish treaty by passage of a bill to abolish the oath of allegiance to the King. "I regret profoundly," Mr. Baldwin said, "anything that hinders what ought to be a law of nature—free trade between Ireland and ourselves."

"What has come to pass is none of our doing. They say the treaty was made under duress. If that be true, it is equally true to say there was duress of another kind on this side. After what has taken place I can see no chance of the British Government entering into any kind of negotiations with the Free State at Ottawa."

But for the rest, the British government was striving for the success of the conference. "We are going in on one endeavor," said Mr. Baldwin, who will lead the delegation, "and that is to get as far as we can in the direction of free trade within the Empire."

"We are sending to Canada with an absolutely free hand an admirable team. Our party is represented by men in whom we place the utmost confidence. There is no difference of opinion between any of us."
