PORTER AND ANTI-TUBERCULOSIS—Mr. Joseph McCarey, President of the Anti-Tuberculosis Society, received word last night that Dr. Porter, Secretary of the Canadian Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis will arrive in Charlottetown Saturday evening. Arrangements are being made for a mass meeting at 4 o'clock Sunday afternoon in the Prince Edward Theatre, where addresses will be given by Dr. Porter and the leading professional men. Dr. Porter will be in the province all of next week and arrangements are being made for meetings at Summerside, Souris, Montague and other centres. On Thursday evening the importance of arousing public opinion with regard to the ravishes of the white plague needs not to be insisted upon here and it is hoped large gatherings will be present on each occasion to listen to what Dr. Porter has to say.

THE PORK MARKET—The market yesterday was small and prices showed little or no change from that of the past few weeks. Hogs are being brought in in fair quantities, but the buyers complain that there is still a tendency on the part of farmers to kill off the undersized and only partly finished animals. The packers are paying 22½ cents, and a fraction over that is being paid for a few small lots for retail. The present high cost of feed is believed to be the cause of so many unfinished hogs being offered. The packers declare that it would be better even to hold these animals over for another season than to sell them in this state, as it is giving a "black eye" both to the farmers and the packers. With the stabilizing of affairs in Europe which must gradually come about there will be a great demand for foodstuffs from this side and Prince Edward Island is bound to share up with the rest of the country in this respect.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT—The many friends of Miss Hilda McEwen of St. Peter's now of the staff of Holman's Ltd., will regret to learn that she has met with a very painful accident. While lighting the stoves in the temporary absence of her boarding lady, Miss McEwen poured some kerosene oil on the smoldering coals which suddenly blazed up setting her clothing on fire and, badly burning her lower limbs, Miss McEwen, who was alone in the house had the presence of mind to wrap herself up, smothering the flames, otherwise she might have suffered even more seriously. Her screams attracted the attention of the neighbors who hastily got medical help and assisted in every way to ease her suffering as it was found she was very seriously burned, fortunately however her face and hair escaped. At latest reports yesterday she was resting well with good hopes of recovery.

TO COMMAND BISLEY TEAM—Major T. F. Elmitt, D. S. O. of Ottawa has been appointed adjutant of the Canadian Rifle Team, to take part in the National Rifle Association matches at Bisley, England, in July. Major Elmitt served overseas for five years. He was a shooting member of the Bisley Team in 1908, and also in 1919. The team will sail from Canada about the 19th of June, and the competitions will commence on July 6th. Mr. G. R. Beer, as previously announced will represent P. E. Island on this team. Arrangements will also be made for an entry from the Canadian team in the Belgian Olympic games, which take place July 23 to 31st.
