LARNED ALLEGES.

That Marconi Infringed on his Patent and

HE WANTS \$100,000

And an Injunction Restraining Marconi From Using the System.

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—Lymna G. Larned of Boston has, through his counsel, Henry A. Prince of 149 Broadway, brought suit in the United States Circuit Court against Guglielmo Marconi to restrain him and his agents from using the system of wireless telegraphy which Larned claims is an infringement of a patent now controlled by him.

The plaintiff in this complaint alleges that the original inventor of this system of telegraphing was Amos Emerson Dolbear. A patent for the system invented by Dolbear was issued on the fifth of October, 1886, to the Dolbear Electric Telephone Company, which had acquired all rights to use the system. These rights were transferred to Larned on the 22nd of July last.

Larned alleges that the means described in the patent under which Marconi purports to carry on his system cannot be used for such work, and are not adapted for commercial use.

Larned asks damages in the sum of \$100,000, and for an injunction restraining Marconi from using the alleged infringing system of telegraphing pending the termination of the suit.

WISHED THEM GODSPEED.

Queen Victoria Visited Gordon Highlanders at their Barracks and Briefly Addressed Them.

LONDON Oct. 21.—The Queen drove from Balmoral Castle to the Ballater barracks Thursday to bid farewell to the Gordon Highlanders, who are going to the Cape. After reviewing the troops, the Queen addressed them as follows: "I am pleased to see you looking so well and fit for duty. You are going on foreign service, and I wish you all a Godspeed. I hope you will return safe and well." The officers were then presented to Her Majesty, the men cheering and the Queen bowing.



It is rumored that the channel squadron has been ordered to Queenstown. Almost everything is now in readiness for the departure of troops from Southampton to-morrow, when five transports, each carrying a thousand men with officers will start for South Africa. The first will sail at 1.30 p. m., the others following at intervals of half an hour.

LETTERS TO SOLDIERS

A Two Cent Stamp Will Carry Them From

CH'TOWN TO S. AFRICA

The Army Postal Corps Has Been Ordered to the Front Fully Equipped.

In response to enquiry the GUARDIAN publishes the following:—

Two cents will carry a letter to any of the Canadian soldiers and their mail may be addressed to them at the front. It will be taken charge of at South Africa by the special postal corps which will have the handling of all mail for the troops on service in that country.

The London post service has been requested by the War Office to make special arrangements with regard to the forwarding of mails for the troops, the army post-office corps is ready to embark. This corps numbers 100 men, with four officers and is ordinarily attached to the 24th Middlesex (Post Office) Rifle Volunteers, of which the Duke of Teck is honorary colonel. In some respects it is a unique body, inasmuch as all its members, belonging to the first-class Army Reserve, being enlisted for the purpose of joining the corps, and only serving a nominal single day with the regular forces. All the men are post-office employees, but when on service will wear the uniform of the 24th.

The previous occasions on which the corps—formed about twenty years ago—was mobilized, was in Egypt in 1882 and 1884, and on returning to civil life the men resumed their usual duties. During the Sudan campaign of last year their services were not called for, and letters addressed to the regiment at the front went out in the ordinary course, and were sent from Cairo to the field base, whence they were distributed under direction of the military authorities.

In equipment the force will be quite complete, even to issuing and carrying postal orders. Telegrams will be accepted for forwarding, though the Royal Engineers, have the primary responsibility for that section. Meanwhile friends and relatives of those who are going to the front may be reminded that a penny stamp is enough for a letter addressed to any man in the army or navy. Both Natal and Cape Colony were among the first to adopt an Imperial penny postage, but it is by no means every one who is aware that no matter where the soldier or the sailor is the humble penny will frank him.

BUTTER INDUSTRY.

OTTAWA, Oct. 20.—The unprecedented development in the Canadian butter trade with Great Britain is the source of great satisfaction to the officers of the agricultural department here. Prof. Robertson, Commissioner of Agriculture and Dairying was seen yesterday regarding the phenomenal increase shown in the Dominion trade returns. After commenting upon the fact that the trade had doubled within a year and that Canadian butter had this year been received on markets hitherto closed to it, he went on to show that this great development was directly traceable to the growing appreciation of Canadian butter as the result of the excellent cold storage facilities afforded for preserving the quality of the product of the Canadian farm.

"What surprises me," added Prof. Robertson, "is that there seem to be some people who are still willing to criticise the cold storage accommodation furnished in Canada. Why we have 300 creameries throughout the country supported by the Government, and with cold storage there, on the trains and on the vessels, it is not a matter of wonder that Canadian butter reaches the market in the best possible condition. There is no other country which furnishes anything like the same facilities in this regard. The cold storage appliances on the Canadian ships are the best that can be

obtained, and the fact is recognized by American shippers, who are willing to use our vessels if we have space left for them. Not only do we furnish the best accommodation, but we do so at a lower rate than that charged elsewhere. In view of these facts I have been much surprised that any one who pretends to know everything about the subject will continue to criticize the course taken by the Government in this regard. Lastly, vessel owners have seen the necessity of providing their ships with cold storage, and the result is that the necessity for government bonuses is falling off. This fact accounts for the reduction in the estimate for cold storage this year. I myself advised that reduction and knowing the circumstances of the case as I do not see how any one can reasonably challenge the conclusion."

CHICKEN FATTENING

Asked regarding the chicken fattening experiments which are being made by the department under his supervision, Prof. Robertson stated that although a calculation of the amount of the gain could not be made for some time yet he had been pleased with the results so far as they could be ascertained. Already three shipments of fattened chickens had left for the English market, and he was satisfied that a large and profitable industry could be built up.
