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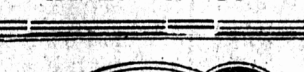

EGGS PLACED IN COLD STORAGE.

FREDERICTON, N. B., Jan. 7.—A delegation was heard last evening by the City Council asking that the city give a grant towards a poultry show here in February. During the course of his remarks one of the delegation said that the encouragement of poultry raising would bring about a larger supply of eggs and thus the price might be lowered to the consumers. Ald. Hugh O'Neill said that it was not a question of a larger supply of eggs that was necessary to cause prices to be reduced, but that something should be done to stop the "cornering" of the market. He said that he had received a card from a York county farmer who was speculating in eggs, stating that he had 15,000 dozen eggs in cold storage at St. John. The statement caused somewhat of a sensation.

RUSSIAN POLICE ARB UP-TO-DATE GRAFTERS.

ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 7.—The sentence of ex-Police Chief Koulyabko of sixteen months in the penitentiary for embezzling \$8,000 of money intended for protecting Stolypin from assassination when at Kieff has lifted a bit of the curtain behind which graft is carried on.

The largest sum in Koulyabko's account passed as admissible was spent by 600 police spies whom he employed for four months ahead of the date of the visit of the Czar and Stolypin to Pultava and Kieff. These spies were disguised as peddlers and furnished with goods to sell peasants' wives and thus get in conversation with the plain people to ascertain news of plots.

Koulyabko not only charged the police Department with 300 per cent. more than the peddlers' wares cost him but pocketed the proceeds of their sales. With the downfall of Minister Makaroff, who succeeded Stolypin at the Department of the Interior, all heads of the political police who took office after Stolypin's murder were also cast out.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—Senator W. Murray Crane, as chairman of the joint committee of Congress, in charge of the inaugural ceremonies, will ride at the inaugural parade in the carriage with the President-elect and the chairman of the Inaugural Committee, Mr. Eustis.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN ROYALTY, STATUTE AND REGULATIONS.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made by any Agency, on certain conditions:—father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. Residence upon the land in question may be within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 16 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. On certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$20 per acre.

Duties.—Must reside upon the homestead of pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to make and cultivate the land and cultivate fifty bushels wheat and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$20 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.
