Christmas Holiday Warnings

In an effort to reduce every possibility of fire during the celebration of the Christmas holidays, certain fixed rules should be observed. The moment a tree is placed in a warm room, the drying process immediately begins, thereby drying out the needles and branches, making them more serious as a fire hazard. The Christmas tree should be braced against falling over and should be located away from doors, fireplaces, stoves or the direct heat of the hot-air outlets for precaution and safety must be taken. Decorations should be of the non-flammable type in order to reduce the possibility of adding further fuel to a burning tree. The "no smoking" rule in the same room containing the tree should be rigidly enforced during the entire period of time the tree is in the house.

As the quick burning action of cotton is well known to all, this material should not be used even sparingly. So-called treated cotton intended to reduce the quick burning point is to be taken with a grain of salt as experiments will prove. The use of room decorations should be confined to the use of materials which have been treated with a special fire-retardant quality.

All fire departments as well as those interested in the fire prevention work are deeply concerned with the prevention of fires during the celebration of the happy event. Just to be on the safe side, write down the fire department telephone number. Should the tree catch fire, never under any circumstances attempt to drag the tree out of doors. Many families as a matter of precaution and preparedness, have the garden hose in readiness, which isn't a bad idea as many will attest.

There happen to be other life and fire dangers in addition which are also very important to understand. What would Christmas be if there was no giving of presents, especially to children. The presenting of a beautiful doll to a little girl is one thing, but give the same "little girl" a toy electric stove and this immediately calls for the electric to go into a "huddle" about it. The first toy, the doll, presents no fire hazard or life hazard whatsoever, no matter how many are used.

Electricity is to-day considered to be the safest known form of energy for lighting and heating. Every detail from the manufacture of this energy, its safe conveyance over the intricate network of wires, these into your home and as used by you in approved electrical appliances has been carefully gone over by experts in order to assure the fullest degree of service and safety.

Again unfortunately, unscrupulous manufacturers of Christmas tree lighting sets have placed upon the market non-standard tree lighting sets which degenerate last a season with any degree of safety. Many Christmas tree fires are the direct result of the cheapness in price. Unapproved sets have no "approval" label on the cord. Many Christmas tree fires are the direct result of the flimsy nature of the cheap sets and should be a sufficient warning that when it comes to electrical appliances, be they what they may, safety and not price should be the paramount factor. Of all the many occasions when we celebrate worthwhile holidays, let us remember those who by their indifference to accepting and sound advice nor look upon Christmas through misty eyes and sad memories.

All India Backs Allied Struggle Against Germany (By G. E. POWELL, Canadian Press Correspondent) CALCUTTA, Dec. 14.—(CP) The recent resolutions of the Congress ministries of several provinces, in protest against the Viceroy's statements on self-government in India, are symptoms of an unfortunate situation but should be kept in perspective.
