ISLANDER DEAD.—Mrs. J. E. Holmes of East Rustico has received a letter from New Zealand, bringing the sad news of the death of her brother Robert B. MacMillan of Halswell. The letter was written by a friend of the deceased, Mr. P. Watson, who stated that Mr. MacMillan was accidentally killed by a collision with a railway train. A friend of his, Mr. E. MacDermott asked him to go and inspect a few horses which had just arrived from America. They went in Mr. MacDermott's motor car which collided with the train. Mr. MacMillan was killed almost instantly. The other man was seriously injured. The late Mr. MacMillan was 57 years of age, and was born at West Covehead in this province. He has been a resident of New Zealand for 32 years, and had a large farm, the "Santa Rosa" at Halswell. Mr. MacMillan dealt extensively in horses, and was very successful in business. He leaves to mourn three children, an aged father, Donald MacMillan of Rustico, one brother James R. MacMillan of West Covehead, and two sisters, Mrs. Olive LePage, Rustico, and Mrs. Holmes.
