CONDITIONS OF BIBLE STUDY CONTEST

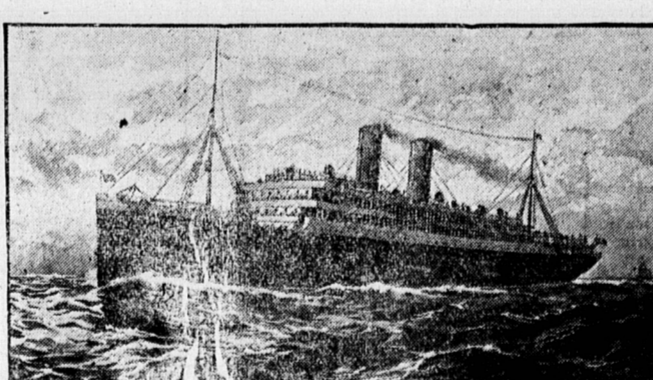

3.
