The regular meeting of the City Council was held last evening. His Worship the Mayor, and all the Councilors present.

A communication from the Town Clerk of Summerside asking for loan of the city steam roller was read and on motion referred to the street committee.

A communication from R. C. Goff was read asking for exemption from taxes on his boot and shoe factory, also on warehouse stock.

Mr. Goff was heard at the Council Board in support of his request. He stated his case clearly and briefly, intimating that without liberal concessions from the city it would be impossible for him to continue the factory.

The matter was referred to His Honor, the Recorder, His Honor read section 81 of the City bylaws bearing on the matter of exemptions. The bylaw provides for exemption only of new industries. Before any action could be taken in this case therefore it would be necessary to secure special legislation.

Mr. Goff's request was most sympathetically received, each of the Councilors and His Worship, the Mayor, expressing their willingness to assist in every way and, virtually promising that the necessary legislation would be introduced.

A sad and somewhat peculiar drowning accident occurred last Friday at New London.

Jabez Tuplin, a carpenter and fisherman, residing near New London went out alone in an eighteen foot motor boat to attend his lobster traps.

After going out a heavy swell arose, although there was no wind, the seas running unusually high. He was seen about noon, his boat filled with traps which, it was supposed, he was moving to other grounds. This was the last seen of him.

On Saturday searching parties went out but the search, which continued all day was fruitless.

Yesterday the boat was discovered, sunk eight or nine fathoms of water just off New London bar. Efforts were made to raise the boat but without success. No trace of the unfortunate man was found.

Efforts to raise the boat will be continued this morning. Deceased was about forty years of age and leaves a widow and three young children besides his father, who resides in Spring Valley, and several brothers and sisters.

The series of Farmers Institute Picnics at the P. E. I. Experimental Farm began yesterday when the Cornwall Institute met at the Farm and were instructed and entertained by Prof. and Mrs. Clark.

The series of picnics have been arranged for the purpose of giving the institutes an opportunity of ascertaining the work done on the farm or the furtherance of agriculture in this province and the Cornwall Institute was the first to respond. Quite a number of teams conveyed the visitors who were equipped with well laden baskets and from these a really sumptuous dinner was prepared, tables being laid in the beautiful shady birth grove, Mrs. Clark supplying tea and coffee.

At two o'clock the visitors began to inspect the premises and were shown small fruits, alfalfa, grain, vegetables, barns, new appliances, and in fact everything of interest on the farm. This occupied the time until 5.30 when the call to supper was heard and another hearty meal was enjoyed. At its close brief and interesting addresses were given by Prof. Clark, J. E. B. McCready and Garnet Leclachur and the President of Cornwall Institute, Hugh McMillan, moved a hearty vote of thanks, seconded by W. Crosby, to Prof. and Mrs. Clark. This was responded to and the singing of God Save the King brought a most pleasant and profitable day to a close.

All present agreed that the series opened most auspiciously and bids fair to be exceedingly popular as they develop.
