**A MONUMENT TO A SCHOOLMASTER**

A pathetic monument has been set up at Jonquiere, in France, to the first schoolmaster who was the first Frenchman to be killed in the Great War.

His text was, "If ye then being evil, know how to give good gifts unto your children; how much more shall your Heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to them that ask him?" (St. Luke, chapter, 11, v. 13). The apostles said His Grace, had been watching the Master at prayer and had observed the wonderful work done by Him and they asked Him to teach them how to pray. In answer there was given to them that concise, yet comprehensive, prayer used at every service of the Church and known as "The Lord's Prayer." The key is in the first word, "Our," covering all nations, colors and races for all look the Universal Father, and all should look on all others as brethren.
