### New Car Ferry, Asked for by Prov. Gov't

Hon. Horace Wright, chairman of the Executive Council of the Provincial Government, who is in Ottawa at present attending a Dominion-Provincial Conference on Labour and representing the local government at the annual meeting of the Association of Tourist and Publicity Bureaus, will take up the matter of a new car ferry with the Federal Government.

He will urge the necessity of beginning the construction of another car ferry to replace the S. S. "Charlottetown."

These representations are pursuant to the actions of the Provincial Government which recently forwarded to the Dominion Government a resolution strongly urging immediate commencement of construction of a suitable ice breaking ferry to replace the lost vessel.

The following is a copy of the above referred to resolution: "Council having under consideration the emergency arising from the loss of the car ferry steamer 'Charlottetown' and the possibility of serious traffic interruption between the Province and the mainland, in the event of any accident to the steamer 'Prince Edward Island' did and do hereby resolve that the Government of Prince Edward Island urge on the Dominion Government the necessity of the immediate construction of a car ferry steamer, particularly in view of the necessity of maintaining inward and outward communication for the air and military training centres and maintaining facilities for export of war time products from the Province."

### Prices Board armed With potent weapon To prevent abuses

OTTAWA, Dec. 1.—(CP)—Already armed with powers as wide as those ever given an organization in Canada, the wartime prices and trade board is confident it will be given additional powers if necessary to prevent inflation, Donald Gordon, board chairman said today.

In a statement issued on the eve of the coming into effect of the federal price-ceiling program, Mr. Gordon reiterated the board's determination to retain inviolate the ceiling established on the basis of prices prevailing from Sept. 15 to Oct. 1.

"If our powers are insufficient for that purpose, I am confident that the government will increase them should it be necessary for the prevention of ruinous inflation," Mr. Gordon said.

An immediate effect of the imposition of the price ceiling tomorrow will be adjustment downward of prices of commodities since the basic period. The board has decreed that future losses caused by this adjustment shall be borne by all those concerned—pushing back the retailer to those who supplied the goods.

Mr. Gordon said the problem of listing the "basic period" prices in all stores throughout the country would present a great problem. Women who bought most of the household goods of Canada, could act as policemen in seeing that the prices they were charged were not higher than those paid during the basic period.

Enforcement Unit

An enforcement unit of the board would be developed to examine goods and investigate the board's surveys and examinations where it was suspected the ceiling rulings were not being observed. This unit will be in process of organization.

"In dealing with those who may attempt to break the price ceiling law we have a potent weapon in the form of the licenses which must be obtained from the board," Mr. Gordon said. "By removal of the license in a case of wrongdoing we can close up a store, although this action would be taken immediately only in an extreme case. At first we will have a 'warning' which will be sufficient."

"Beyond that we may take criminal action against those who refuse to obey the law. Investigators will go about their duties as officials of the board in addition to anticipate having the assistance of the weights and measures branch inspectors in the early stages at least."

The various administrators under the board will keep in touch with the various activities under their jurisdiction. Mr. Gordon said that if a restaurant attempted to defile the price ceiling provisions by serving smaller portions, the services administrator would be interested.

"But the old competitive factors will remain and good cooks and good waiters will have a 'cut' on their business," Mr. Gordon said. "Every person selling meals is legally supposed to serve the same meals at the same price as during the basic period. The board will do its best to see that these standards are maintained."

No Common Level

The ceiling prices does not mean there will be a common level of prices, Mr. Gordon said. At stores where commodities were higher than at others during the basic period, the ceiling will be higher.

"The ceiling that we are vitally interested in is that of the retailer," Mr. Gordon said. "The manufacturer's price, for example, may be adjusted up or down right back to the price of the manufacturer. The administrators will get together the various groups concerned to work out equitable settlements following the 'squeeze'."

The farmer as a primary producer would obtain a fair price, as the board would know what he was entitled to receive from the buyers of his produce, such as packing houses.

As a result of the application of the price ceiling, Mr. Gordon said it is hoped that the cost-of-living index maintained by the dominion bureau of statistics would come down after a levelling off period which would be in evidence for a few months.

In any event, changes in the index should be of minor proportions if the price-control program is effective, Mr. Gordon said. Seasonal factors in products such as fruit and vegetables, which are exempt from the ceiling, would still affect the index.

The index at Oct. 1 was 115.3.
