LAW MAKERS IN SESSION

Work in the Legislature During Past Two Days

Report of the Public Works Department Submitted by the Commissioner—Good Showing in that Branch of Government

THURSDAY April 7. House met at 11.45.

At twelve o'clock the speaker and members waited upon the Lieutenant Governor in the old Legislative Council Room and presented him with the address in reply to the Speech from the Throne.

Mr. Godkin presented a petition praying for an act to incorporate the Christian Church of Summerside. In accordance therewith a bill was presented read a first time and referred to the Private Bills committee.

Hon. Mr. Hughes presented a petition from Hugh McMillan, Ronald McMillan, W. H. Altken, Benjamin Rogers and others praying that an act be passed intitled an "Act to incorporate the Maritime Steamship Company." A bill in accordance therewith was read a first time and referred to the Private Bills committee.

Hon. George Forbes presented a petition from Alexander Matheson, Martin Martin, Malcolm W. Martin, Laufflin McDonald and others, residents of Grand View Lot 57 asking for an act to be passed to incorporate the Grand View Public Hall Company. A bill in accordance therewith was read a first time and referred to the Private Bills committee.

Hon. Mr. Rogers presented a Bill to be intitled an act to amend an act to provide for the incorporation of Cheese and Butter Manufacturing Associations. The bill was read a first time and set down for second reading tomorrow.

Hon. Mr. Cummings submitted the annual report of the Department of Public Works. It was one which he presented to the House with some pride. The total expenditure this year was \$118,453; last year it was \$113,399.49. The expenditure this year was larger than last. \$4,500 has been expended more than last year, in installing new heating apparatus in Falcowood Asy. um, \$1400 more for sewerage in the Provincial Buildings. \$2700 more has been expended on bridges \$5000 more than last year on roads, \$2300 on wharves. These were extraordinary expenditures. There was granted \$24,000 for roads and bridges.

BY THE LEGISLATURE LAST YEAR AND \$23,427.40 WAS EXPENDED BY THE DEPARTMENT.

This year for the fourth time he met the House as Commissioner of Public Works and on each occasion had an expenditure within the estimates. This was a highly creditable record and one never made by any other Commissioner of Public Works.

On motion of Hon Mr Peters an act to amend an act further to amend the County Courts amendment act 1878 was read a second time and referred to a committee of the whole with Mr Gallant in the chair.

The bill which is only to change the circuits of Kings County Court was explained by the Premier, and after a suggestion from Mr McDonald and Mr McLean as to the changing of the dates of holding the Courts, progress was reported and leave asked to sit again.

House adjourned at 1 o'clock till tomorrow at ten.

FRIDAY April 8. House met at 12 o'clock.

Hon. Mr. Hughes presented a petition from the City Council and certain citizens of the City of Charlottetown praying that an act be passed intitled "An act to extend North River Road and add to Victoria Park. A bill in accordance therewith was introduced, read a first time and referred to the Private Bills Committee.

Hon. Mr. Hughes presented to the House a Petition from James D. Laphorn and others praying for an act to incorporate J. D. Laphorn and company Limited. A bill in accordance therewith was introduced, read a first time and referred to the Private Bills Committee.

Mr. Irving asked the Premier if a petition has been received from Captain Laughlin McNeill and other inhabitants of Queens County praying that a bill be introduced into the Legislature authorizing trials by jury in County Courts and Sipsen-Hary Magistrates' Courts, when both sides in suits ask for the same, and what act has been taken.

In speaking of the question Mr. Irving said the petition had been signed by some most respectable men. The petitioners have no intention of casting any doubts on the Courts named. The Judges stand very high in the estimation of the public. Their ability and their integrity is unquestioned. The petitioners have made a plain request and Mr. Irving hoped it would receive the consideration that its importance merited.

Hon. Mr. Peters said the petition had been received. He could hold out no hope that such a course should be adopted as it would be a backward step. Juries are being abolished at every term of the Supreme Court and nearly every suit is now tried by the Judge alone.

Hon. Mr. McNutt, chairman of the Private Bills Committee reported that the bill to incorporate the Grand View Hall Company, the bill to incorporate the Maritime Steamship Co., and the bill to incorporate the Christian Church of Summerside were of private nature. They were not down for second reading on Monday.

On a motion of Hon. Mr. Peters the House resolved itself into committee of the whole with Mr. Gallant in the chair to consider a bill to amend an act further to amend the County Courts amendment act.

The bill provides that the First Circuit of the said County Court shall be held at or near Souris East, Lot Forty-five; the Second Circuit shall be held at or near the Head of St. Peter's Bay, Lot Forty-one; the Third Circuit shall be held at or near Grand River, Lot Fifty-five; the Fourth Circuit shall be held at or near the Head of Murray River, Lot Sixty-three or Lot 64 as may be deemed most convenient; and the Fifth Circuit shall be held at or near Georgetown, and that the time for holding the Court be in January, March, July and October instead of August, October, December and March as in the past. This is to come into effect on September 1st 1904.

NOTABLE DIVINE ON BIBLE CRITICISM

Contemporary Review Contains a Remarkable Article by Canon Hensley Henson.

(Canadian Associated Press.) London, April 5.—Canon Hensley Henson's article in the Contemporary Review upon "The Future Bible" has attracted widespread attention. He says the very fact that so many of our people are prepared to acquiesce in what they hear from the Lectern and even to believe that in some way or other what they hear is divinely true makes the present indiscriminate reading of the Bible in public an extremely perilous proceeding. Canon Henson goes on to point out that all educated men have at their disposal the means of escape from the perplexities that stirred their minds by the incredible, puerile or demoralizing narratives which the Old Testament contains, but the transition is prompt and obvious in uneducated minds from a sacred volume, too sacred for discussion, to a pack of lies too gross for toleration. Canon Henson enquires what will be the place of the Bible in the future. He predicts that in time there will be a great revolution in the current teaching with respect to the New Testament.
