MR. SCOTT DAWSON

PICTON, July 17.—A sad tragedy which has cast a gloom over the festivities of the Hector celebration occurred this morning, when Scott Dawson, of this place, was struck and run over by the Government's special train, at New Hazelton siding, outside Picton, lying in the Cottage Hospital, Picton, shortly after 3 o'clock this afternoon as the result of his injury.

Mr. Dawson who is very deaf, was crossing the tracks when the train struck him, several of the cars passed over his body and almost completely severing both legs. He was also badly injured about the head.

Scott Dawson was one of the most prominent men in Picton and was well known throughout the entire country. He was sixty-seven years of age. He was a son of the late John Adam Dawson, for one term member of parliament for Picton, a colleague of the late Senator Curran. He was born in Picton and spent practically all his life in the old ship town. He is survived by his widow, one son, John W., at home and two daughters Mildred at home and Miss Dawson in Charlottetown.

A brother, Frank, and a sister, Mrs. Samuel Bishop of Brooklyn, survive.

An inquest returned a verdict of accidental death.

A letter of sympathy was received by the family from the Governor-General. Many beautiful flowers have been received from friends.
