ALCOHOL QUIZ

The Economic Problem of Alcohol

1. What is the economic basis of the welfare of a community or a nation?

The economic basis of the welfare of the individual or community depends upon the way in which the purchaser's dollars are spent, resulting in the production of goods of real social value in some field of constructive business or of professional or cultural enterprise.

2. How can this principle be illustrated?

For instance, the purchase of motor cars increased wages provided jobs, culminated in good roads, reduced the price of the product through the demands for mass production while increasing the value of the product. The automobile industry has changed our entire economy for the better.

3. How does the Liquor Traffic affect the economic welfare of the individual or the community?

It is the only trade whose competition in any community seriously lessens the purchasing power of its patrons for the necessities of life.

4. How does the Liquor Traffic affect real estate values in the neighborhood of its places of sale?

"It is the only trade whose retail establishments depress real estate values and lower living conditions wherever they exist, either in legal or illicit places of sale."

5. Why is this a fact?

Because "it is the only trade through whose community portals emerge thousands of drinking drivers and pedestrians who provide a major cause for accidents and fatalities."

6. Does not the beer parlor or cocktail lounge have a social value to the neighborhood?

The retail trade for consumption on the premises has a social glamour, and proffers an attractive meeting place, which snarls thousands of youths, men and women. Also in increasing numbers, with the anticipation of pleasurable entertainment, but this results in physically harmful, socially hazardous and economically wasteful living through the habit-forming quantities of all kinds of beverage alcohol.

7. But is not the community safeguarded by laws approved by the citizenry which restrict the Liquor Traffic?

The Liquor Traffic is the only trade that continues to defy every

THE ROAD ACT, 1936

The following Sections of The Road Act are for public information:
NO BUILDINGS TO BE ERECTED WITHIN 20 FEET OF INTERSECTION

Section 75 provides that:—"Except in cities and incorporated towns, no person shall, without the permission of the Minister, erect buildings where highways intersect at a distance less than twenty feet from the nearest point on any such highway and any person violating the provisions of this Section shall be liable to a fine of twenty-five dollars to be recovered in the manner provided by Section 52 of the said Act. And if such person fails to remove any such building on the written request of the Minister, the Minister may cause the said building to be removed or demolished at the expense of the owner."

NO BUILDINGS TO BE ERECTED WITHIN 25 FEET OF BOUNDARY OF ROAD

Sections 75A and 75B, added to The Road Act in 1947, provide that:—
75A. "Beyond the limits of cities and incorporated towns and within a radius of two miles from such incorporate limits, no person shall, without the permission of the Minister, erect buildings at a distance of less than twenty-five feet from the boundary of any highway or road, nor shall any such buildings be erected at a distance of less than fifty feet from those of the next adjoining owner."
75B. "Any person violating the provisions of Section 75A shall be subject to the same penalties and right of removal or demolition as provided by Section 75 of this Act."

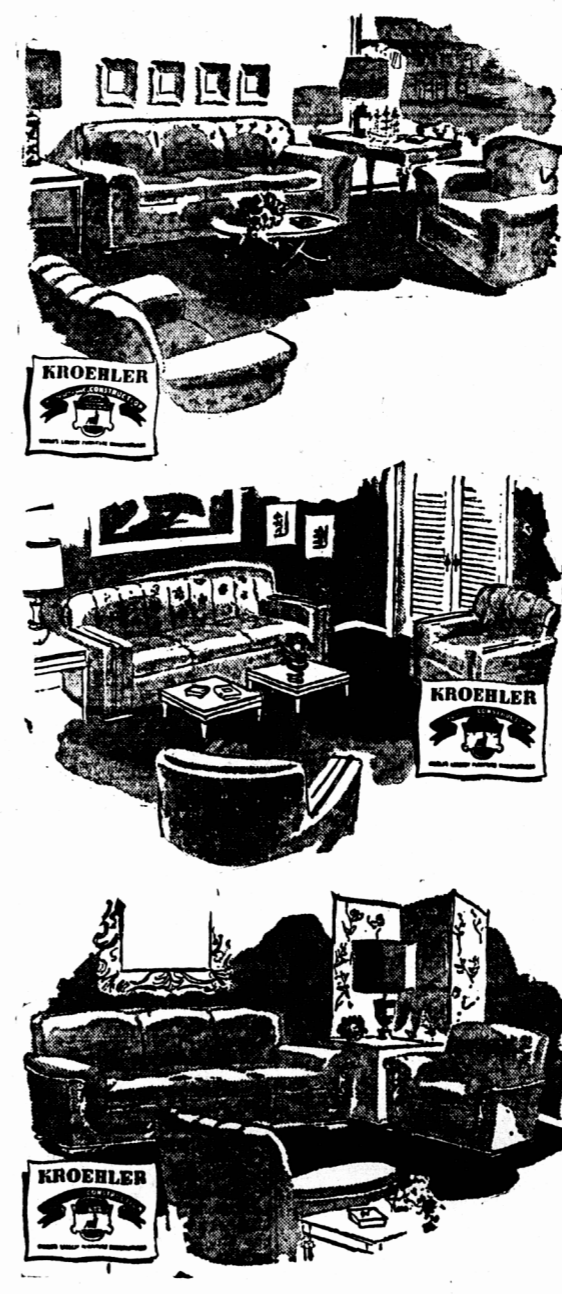

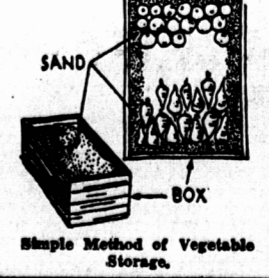
Vegetables Keep Well For Weeks In Unheated Garage

Vegetables which remain unused in the small garden after freezing weather has put an end to the harvest can usually be stored in a garage in good condition for several weeks, and in most cases can be used up in that time.

which you would consider in good condition for table use. Do not clean the dirt from them, but place them in boxes and pack them in sand, loam and sawdust.

Vegetables which have passed their prime are not worth storing. Those which show evidence of disease or insect injury, or which have been bruised, will not keep well. Young vegetables are better than old for storing; they continue to mature in storage, though at a very slow rate.

The temperature at which these vegetables keep best should be between 35 and 40 degrees, sufficient to keep them dormant, so that no sprouts develop, and to prevent crying out, which causes them to shrink and to lose flavor. They must be protected against freezing but the risk is not great in a garage until outdoor temperatures are much below freezing.



Simple Method of Vegetable Storage.

Beets, carrots, potatoes, turnips and rutabagas, should all be given the same treatment which is as follows:

Dig them up as late as possible before the ground begins to freeze and cut the tops off. Do not allow the roots to dry, but examine them carefully to and store only those
