WRESTLING.

BOSTON, March 12.—Earl Cadlock, of Iowa, defeated Tom Draak in two straight falls in their wrestling bout here. The first fall was made in sixty-six minutes and two seconds and the second in thirty-two seconds, both with a head scissors and wrist lock.

Wano Ketonen on Wednesday at Worcester defeated Mike Yokel in two straight falls, regaining the middleweight wrestling title, lost within a month. Ketonen got the first fall in 46 minutes 35 seconds with a body scissors and severe hammerlock and the second in 32 minutes 29 seconds with a toe hold.

SYDNEY DEFEATED BY NEW GLASGOW.

The Sydney hockey team went down to defeat in the second game with the New Glasgow champions at the arena in New Glasgow last week. The ice was heavy on account of the mild weather, and made fast playing out of the question. Sydney had a new player on their line up, Dan Chisholm, from Antigonish, who made a very good showing. The Sydney goal keeper played a great game. His stops were numerous and the score would have been a great deal larger if he did not make so many wonderful stops. Chester Gregory and his line-up were out to win and rolled up 3 to 1 in the first period and scored one and blanked the visitors in the third. New Glasgow scored the only goal in the final period, the game ending 4-2.

LIPTON PREPARING YACHT FOR TRIP TO NEW YORK

A London despatch says:—Sir Thomas Lipton's 23-metre racing cutter Shamrock is being fitted out at Southampton for a voyage to New York. On her arrival she will be used as a "trial horse" for the "America's Cup" challenger, Shamrock IV. Captain A. Disper, a well-known yacht skipper, will be in command of the vessel, which is expected to leave the Solent about the end of March.

A picked crew for the challenger will leave for New York about the middle of April in charge of Captain Turner, of Ipswich, who for many years has acted as sail master to William P. Burton, the well-known amateur yachtsman, who will steer Shamrock IV in the cup contest.

SCOTLAND ISSUES INVITATION TO CANADIAN CURLERS.

Secretary G. S. Peary of the Ontario Curling Association has received a communication from A. Davidson Smith of Edinburgh, Secretary of the Royal Caledonian Curling Club, remarking the proposed trip of the Canadian curlers to Scotland next year.

Mr. Smith suggests that the tour be made so that the games can be played next January and that the team of six rinks be chosen from the various associations throughout Canada and be as representative as possible of each district.

Secretary Peary will some time before the fall send out circulars to each member of the O. C. A., asking that they nominate a candidate for the trip and from the various nominations, the O. C. A. executive will make the selection for Ontario. One man from each association will represent that association on the team.
