TO REFORM PARLIAMENT.

Beyond all other legislative bodies in the world those of Britain and the great overseas states of the British Empire have the bad habits of talk and late night sittings. Canada has these faults in excess, and our fine Parliament Building, on the hill at Ottawa, has been irreverently spoken of as the "Gib-House". One Mr. Wright, M. P. for South Renfrew has made a sensible proposal for its reform.

He would provide that the hour for adjournment at night shall be fixed at not later than 10.30 o'clock except in cases of urgency. It is apparent that with this ought to come some reasonable limitation of the length of speeches. When it costs \$37 a minute, or \$2.20 an hour to run the House of Commons alone, the criminality of a five hours speech made up of mere partyism, personalities, insinuations and abuse becomes apparent. Very few long speeches are worth the \$5,000 to \$10,000 each which they cost the country.

In Austria the popular chamber sits from 11 o'clock in the forenoon to 4 or 5 o'clock in the afternoon. In Belgium the legislative sittings are from 1.45 p. m. to 5.30. In Denmark the popular chamber sits from half an hour to four hours and a half, in the day time. In France the Chamber of Deputies sits from 2.30 to 6.30 p. m. In Germany the rule is from 1.30 p. m. to 6.30. The Hungarian House sits from 10 a. m. till 2 p. m. In Italy the Chamber of Deputies sits from 2 p. m. to 6 p. m. In Japan the popular Chamber sits from 1 p. m. to 6 p. m. In Washington both the Senate and House of Representatives get through their work in the day time.

In fact the example of the entire foreign world is against the British and Canadian practice of late night sittings. The long night sittings wear out the health and the lives of Ministers and Members and the death rate during the sessions is alarmingly high in proportion to numbers. It is a great and needed reform to cut out the late sittings, the long speeches and personalities and to make of the Canadian Parliamentary session a meeting of sensible, practical business men, attending to the country's business sensibly in the day time.

OUR WINTER SHIPMENTS.

Prince Edward Island is enjoying an open fall for navigation, which is something to be thankful for in view of the amount of produce to be moved and the importance of our winter fishery. We trust that both the Charlottetown and Summerside routes may yet be kept open for weeks to come. But prudent foresight by the Maritime Department is especially necessary at the moment to avoid the

mistakes of the past.
For one thing care should be taken that the refrigerator car which now carries fresh shipments to the American market should be promptly transferred to Picton the moment the Summerside route shall be closed. Another vital point, now that the two winter steamers are on the Charlottetown-Picton route, is that they shall be kept here as long as possible. As they make but single trips daily, sailing in the morning with all day before them, they should be able to keep on this route till midwinter. This would best serve the business interest of the City and Province and would remove one source of the loud and strenuous complaint of the past.

THE WISDOM OF THE EAST.

The Western world is learning from the east in these days and has in recent years been both astonished and instructed by Japan. It has learned new lessons of patriotism and courage, of statecraft and diplomacy, and has revised all its old estimates of the capability of the eastern people and of the religion a philosophy of the east, as well. And now we have Bishop Root of the Protestant Episcopal Church, stationed in China, expressing his tribute to the Chinese and their virtues as a people.

How times have changed when it is the pleasure of a Christian bishop and missionary to say: "It is difficult to take in the moral greatness of these people. They are the only people outside of Christendom who have never defiled vice who have ever placed unsavory stories in their classics, who have never publicly sanctioned immorality. Their ideals have been scholarship, peace with the world and righteousness, and it may be their mission to impress these upon the world."

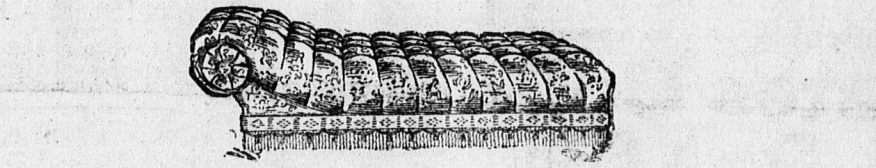
