REV. ROBERT and Mrs. McArthur returned to Nova Scotia yesterday via the S. S. Princess.

MR. F. M. BAKER, the popular travelling agent of the C. leveland bicycle, leaves this city this morning for St. John. N. B.

THE third lecture of the course of the Y. M. C. A. of St. James church to be delivered by Mr. T. C. James will be specially interesting. The subject will be The Reign of Queen Elizabeth and will be illustrated by stereoscopic views.

DIED IN BOSTON.—The body of Mr. Wellington W. Craswell was brought to the city yesterday en route to South Rustico, P. E. I. for interment. Deceased was in his 38th year and died at Boston of heart disease on Monday last. Some floral tributes accompanied the remains.—St. John Telegraph.

A MEETING of the intermediate hockey league was held at the Queen's rink, St. John, Wednesday evening, when the schedule of games to be played this winter was drawn up, and two new teams were elected. The following teams will form the league this winter: Victorias, High School, Y. M. C. A., St. John B. and A. and Mohawks.

AN Ottawa despatch says that Edward N. Bill, barrister, Shelburne, has been appointed to conduct the investigation into the management of the Dorchester penitentiary. The commissioner originally named was Hon. David Laird, who resigned to become Indian commissioner. He was succeeded by D. McDonald, of Antigonish, who declined to act, assigning illness as the cause. It is said the inquiry will now proceed at once.

A VERY pretty and quiet wedding took place at the residence of Horatio Nelson, Esq., father of the bride. Miss Alice Nelson, of Montague, and Mr. Clarence White were made one. The knot was tied by Rev. H. Penca. The bride looked charming in a dress of Kitchener blue trimmed with chiffon, and was supported by Miss Ella Phillips, dressed in cream. The groom was supported by Mr. H. J. Nelson, brother of the bride. On account of the illness of Mrs. Nelson, the bride's mother, only a few of the immediate friends were present. The presents were numerous and handsome. The members of the choir of the Methodist church presented the bride with an address and a very handsome parlor lamp as a token of esteem and appreciation of her valuable assistance to the choir of which she has been a member for a good many years. A very large number attended the bible reading yesterday afternoon in St. Paul's when the Bishop spoke upon the Chastisement of God. As this is a subject which is very much misunderstood in the midst of so much affliction those present must have been greatly helped by the spiritual lessons which were pointed out in God's dealings with men. At the evening service the Bishop took for his text "Thine eye is everywhere beholding the evil and the good." The sermon was as usual a torrent of convincing eloquence, calculated to bring the wills of men into subjection to the all-seeing God. The after meeting was also very helpful when the subject of God's forgiveness was beautifully explained. Those who find so much sentiment and unreasonable speculation in much of the religion of the day who happen not to be there, lost a great blessing in not hearing Dr. Courtney's explanation of how simple, reasonable and right is God's forgiveness to man.

THE first Presbyterian minister settled on P. E. Island, was the Rev. Peter Gordon. He came out from Scotland in 1806 and landed in Halifax, where he preached six Sundays. Then he travelled to Windsor, and from there to Saubenaclie, preaching one day at each place. He was settled at St. Peter's, P. E. I., in October 1807, and with the exception of the Rev. Mr. DesBrisay, was the only minister on the whole Island. He was ordained in Charlottetown in the Episcopal Church, and only labored for three years. He died on the 2nd April 1809, and was so lovingly held in remembrance that he was called the Apostle of P. E. Island. There being no stone in this Province suited for monuments, a young man who revered his memory, erected one of wood at the back of the pulpit of the church in which he ministered. In 1840 a stone monument was placed over his grave, a plain free stone slab, which commemorates the memory of P. E. Island's first Presbyterian minister.—Hants Journal.

### ENQUIRY COLUMN.

What are the characteristics of the Russian soldier? Is he brave when properly officered? Ans. The Russian soldier is physically strong, capable of great endurance, devotedly attached to his country and mother church. For these he will fight bravely. He is more superstitious and consequently more liable to panic than British soldiers are and lacks the dash and adventurous spirit of the soldiers of free countries. But he is brave and obeys his officers with uncomplaining obedience.

Please answer the following enquiries: (1) Is tubercular consumption hereditary? (2) Is the tendency to weak lungs hereditary? (3) Is leprosy hereditary?

Ans 1 and 2. Tubercular consumption is not, in the ordinary sense a hereditary malady but weak lungs, and a consequent predisposition to pulmonary disease may be transmitted from parents to children. (3) Leprous parents transmit the disease to their children usually, and if it does not appear in their immediate offspring usually does so in the following generation.

(1) In what language are the proceedings of the Spanish American conference in Paris conducted? (2) In what language will the St. Petersburg conference be conducted? Ans. (1) The written papers are submitted respectively in English and Spanish and translations are made for the use of the opposing parties to the commission. (2) The French language, which is the recognized language of diplomacy in European countries.
