TEMPERANCE WORK.—The exercises for the Jubilee took place at the Immaculate Conception Church, Palmer's Road, the first days of this week, and were attended by an immense concourse of worshippers. The Revs. A. E. Burke, F. X. Gallant, Theodore Gallant and J. S. Murphy assisted the zealous pastor, Rev. Dr. Chaisson. On Sunday the Blessed Sacrament was exposed and remained exposed until Tuesday morning. There was a solemn High Mass with sermon each day and also devotional exercises in the evenings. The Rev. F. X. Gallant preached two eloquent and practical sermons in French and Rev. Father Burke spoke with great force, eloquence and effect in English. Perhaps no more powerful sermon than that of the reverend gentleman on the vice of intemperance has been heard anywhere. He showed the enormity of the sin of drunkenness, the seductiveness of the occasions which led up to it, the unfortunate state of the traffic in the country, the misery and confusion it brings upon its votaries, and indirectly the great injury it does to the community. He asked those who possibly could drink without committing sin to abstain from the cup that inebriates for their weak brothers' sake and above all help to raise up a young generation of teetotalers. The Temperance Cause had lost ground in this Province because of the dishonesty of the erstwhile temperance advocates and the trickery of politicians. But if we could raise up a generation of true temperance people we would compel those in high places to be honest in their advocacy and make or unmake the government which juggled with the law. He said that the villages of the west were hot beds of villany and seductiveness. Rum was sold everywhere and drug stores were worse than beer dens. He exhorted decent people to avoid being seen in such places and said that if his influence stood for anything in the county he hoped he would exert it to the last limit in inculcating sound temperance sentiment. The sermon produced a sensation—great numbers took the pledge.
