DISORDERS BREAK OUT IN LONDON AND PARIS

REBELS HALT ADVANCE TO FORTIFY LINES

MADRID FACES FOOD SHORTAGE

Restoration of Monarchy May Follow Rebel Victory, Report.

MADRID, Oct. 5—(Monday)—(AP)—The War Ministry declared early today Government forces had recaptured the town of Maqueda, an important highway intersection 25 miles southwest of Madrid.

The government advance from Santa Cruz del Retamar, the War Ministry asserted, brought the Madrid forces within a mile or two of Santa Olalla, their former base, and cut off the Fascists in the Toledo sector.

The town of Quismondo, about four miles nearer Madrid than Maqueda, fell into the hands of the Government column as it moved forward, the communists stated.

The Socialist Government hastened convoys of food into Madrid yesterday in the face of a food shortage in the province; for the armed defenders, acknowledging that the all critical siege of the capital is about to

FEY DEFIES STAR HEMBERG

VIENNA, Oct. 4—(A.P.)—While Major Emul Fey and Prince Ernst Von Starhemberg remained at log-gerheads today over which of them would control the Vienna Heimwehr, observers pictured their fight as rapidly changing the political outlook in Austria.

Sources close to the Chancellery professed belief that Von Starhemberg, the country's chief exponent of Fascism who sought to expel Fey from the private army, was losing ground. They said Dr. Kurt Schuschnigg, Chancellor of Austria, favored Fey, who describes himself as a monarchist in principle.

Both consulted their advisers today after the fiery exchange in which Starhemberg ordered Fey ousted from the Heimwehr, and in which Fey retorted he not only would remain but also would assume its leadership.

Fey issued a communique declaring his ejection from the Heimwehr meant every connection between him and Von Starhemberg was broken.

"Sustained by the faithfulness of my comrades I hereby take over the command of the Vienna Heimwehr," Major Fey proclaimed, "in its hour of greatest need. . . . Henceforth only my orders are valid in Heimwehr matters."

MARRIES AT 106

Increase Shown In Dairy Output

OTTAWA, Oct. 4—(C.P.)—A substantial increase was shown in both volume and value of creamery butter in 1935 over the previous year, while cheese showed increases of a lesser degree in both volume and value, according to a report issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics.

Creamery butter produced in 1935 amounted to 240,892,472 pounds worth \$52,222,604 compared with 254,852,961 at \$48,168,592 in 1934 and the output of cheese totalled 100,427,390 pounds worth \$10,570,309 against 99,346,617 at \$9, 717,588 the previous year.

Production of butter in the Maritimes with 1934 figures in brackets: Nova Scotia 4,907,624 (5,732,666); New Brunswick 2,973,856 (3,220,003); Prince Edward Island 1,672,822 (1,834,836).

Production of cheese: New Brunswick 274,133 (347,355); Prince Edward Island 212,111 (340,032).

BANK ROBBER IS CAPTURED

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) BRANTFORD, Ont., 4—(C.P.)—A man who identified himself as William Thomas, Hamilton, tonight faced charges in connection with the armed holdup of the Royal Bank branch at Scotland, a tiny village 10 miles out of here yesterday.

The lone bandit who walked into the little office and said, "Allright, this is a stickup," escaped amid a hail of bullets in a car which he had left running in front of the bank with the engine running. Nearly a score of shots was fired by the robber, J. C. Moore, Manager of the bank, and A. M. Reid, his teller. Speeding eastward the fugitive car was wrecked not a mile from the village when it crashed into a hydro pole.

A posse of 150 farmers under police direction spread a net over the thick bush country in which the man was seen to disappear and he was captured.

Plaster was knocked from the walls and windows broken where bullets took effect in the bank. "It just made me mad at the time," said Mr. Moore when asked how he felt when facing the gunman. "I wasn't nervous until it was all over."

Italy Seeking Monetary Accord

ROME, Oct. 4—(AP)—A well-informed source tonight said extensive negotiations were in progress between Italy, Great Britain and France, seeking the lines of a general economic and monetary accord in preparation for devaluation of the lira.

The United States has been informed of the conversations, this source stated.

If an accord is reached before Monday's cabinet meeting the lira will be devalued 35 to 40 per cent, it was stated, otherwise, no change will be made.

Fatally Shot While Hunting

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MEMRAMCOOK, N.B., Oct. 4—(C.P.)—Alme Dupuis, 20, was fatally shot while hunting in the woods near here this afternoon.

According to police, Dupuis dropped his rifle to the ground and it discharged, the bullet entering his head.

TELLS OF WORK FOR CRIPPLED CHILDREN

Hon. Dr. MacMillan Returns from Attending Kiwanis Convention at Saint John.

Crippled children's work in Prince Edward Island received widespread publicity as a result of an address delivered before the eighteenth annual district Kiwanis convention at Quebec City on Sept. 21 by Hon. Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, who returned home on Saturday evening.

The convention, representative of Ontario, Quebec and Maritime Provinces Kiwanians, was very largely attended and great interest was taken in Dr. MacMillan's statements, which were illustrated by a motion picture film taken by Mr. Cleveland Craswell. His Worship Mayor J. E. Grogan and Mr. E. C. Woodley, president of the Quebec Kiwanis Club, were the convention hosts. The business sessions were held in the Jacques Cartier room of the Chateau Frontenac. Hon. P. C. Biggs, former Minister of Highways of Ontario, was also a guest speaker.

On the following Tuesday, Hon. Dr. MacMillan and Hon. Mr. Biggs were also guest speakers at wreath-laying ceremonies at the Wolfe-Montcalm Monument at the Governor's Garden, Quebec, each of the visiting speakers bringing a message from his respective Province. Mr. Gerald Martineau, general convention chairman, presided at this function. Other speakers were District Governor E. P. Dawson, of Sarnia, and Hon. J. Oscar Druin, representing the Government of the Province of Quebec.

While in Quebec City, Hon. Dr. MacMillan had an interesting interview with Premier Duplessis, whom he found to be a gentleman of charming personality as well as brilliant attainments.

Dr. MacMillan was accompanied by Mrs. MacMillan and Rev. R. J. MacDonald, of St. Columba, on his motor visit to Quebec and Boston. They found the highways in excellent condition with the exception of New Brunswick, where a great deal of construction work is going on at the present time.

Before leaving Quebec Province they visited the famed shrine of St. Anne de Beaupre, which is visited almost daily by thousands of pilgrims.

France Slashes Tariff Duties

PARIS, Oct. 4—(CP)—Havas—Lowering of international trade barriers promised by the Anglo-Franco-American monetary accord, was spurred today by a series of Government decrees slashing tariff duties on non-quota merchandise as much as 20 per cent, and lowering importers' taxes on others.

Following quickly upon parliamentary ratification of devaluation, trade measures made public Saturday offered material aid to the renewed activity in world trade expected to result from realignment of currencies.

In its final form, the franc-devaluation bill substituted for the "social clauses" sought by the Blum Government an amendment empowering the government to prevent rises not caused by an advance in the value of imported merchandise.

70 DEAD AS STORM SWEEPS THROUGH JAPAN

TOKYO, Oct. 4—(AP)—A typhoon which missed Tokyo but wreaked great havoc throughout much of Japan, continued its sweep of death and destruction today.

It streaked across the Sea of Japan northwards to the Island of Sagahalin, leaving death and wreckage in a belt 300 miles wide.

Fishing boats foundered with all aboard. Many large vessels were crippled and were reported drifting dangerously, houses were blown over or submerged in torrential rain.

Several were known killed on Sagahalin but crippled communications prevented an estimate of the death toll. Unofficial reports placed the death count at 70.

The Hokkaido district, northernmost of the main islands in the Japanese group, suffered extensive loss of life and property. Emperor Hirohito, there reviewing troops, was forced to go indoors and the manoeuvres were washed out.

At Shiamata a naval plane plunged into the sea and its crew of eight were killed.

Brief accounts of the storm from Hokkaido said 148 houses were razed by the wind, 583 dwellings inundated and 61 ships crippled.

Foundering vessels were said to include such 3,000-ton ships as the Goho Maru, the Sakae Maru and the Dalsan Unkal Maru.

Police Active As Communists And Fascists Clash

Fighting Occurs At Parc de Princes — Mosleyites Demonstration In London Cancelled.

PARIS, Oct. 4—(AP)—Mobs fought in the streets of Paris today, overturned taxis, and hurled paving blocks through windows as 100,000 Communists assembled for a meeting in the Parc des Princes in defiance of Rightist demonstrators.

The fighting broke out around the park an hour before the scheduled Communist gathering.

Crowds of the Communists and followers of the Rightist Colonel Francois de la Rocque, charged in the past with Fascist leanings, clashed in the streets leading into the park.

They administered severe beatings to one another in a number of cases before police could separate them. Several taxis carrying groups of Rightists were overturned in the Avenue Versailles and their occupants beaten.

RAID TAXI

One taxi filled with Rightists and waving the French tricolor rushed a crowd of Communists carrying a red flag. The Communists dragged the taxi chargers from the machine, sailed into them with fists and overturned the cab.

Many shop windows were smashed and proprietors hastily closed their buildings. Communists dug up paving blocks and hurled them through windows of taxis used by the Rightist flying squads.

The Rightists poured from buses and subways and tried to assemble at the Porte St. Cloud but Mobile Guards dispersed them. The Rightists escaped down side streets only to fall into the hands of waiting Communists.

Mounted Mobile Guards galloped up the crowded avenues from Porte Dauphine and the combatants took refuge in other side streets. The Guardsmen, however, had arrested 350 persons by early afternoon.

CONDUCT SORTIES

Rightists attending a football game at St. Jean Bouin stadium sallied forth from time to time to seize and beat Communist groups.

About 100,000 were estimated to be in the Parc des Princes as the Communist meeting was about to begin. De la Rocque's followers appeared to number not more than 20,000.

Premier Blum returning from Geneva was met at the station by the Prefect of Police who reported on the situation. Away from the park the city remained calm as cafes and restaurants reopened after suspension of a waiters strike.

PARADE CANCELLED

LONDON, Oct. 4—(AP)—Anti-Fascist demonstrators massed in London's east end today forced sudden cancellation of a parade by the British Union of Fascists.

Open Court Proceedings To Oust Three Liberal Members

MONTREAL, Oct. 4—(CP)—Legal action to have declared null the election last Aug. 17, of three Liberal members of the Quebec Legislature was launched in Superior Court today by members of Premier Maurice Duplessis' Union Nationale Party.

The ouster proceedings, charging electoral malpractice, attacked the Montreal Laurier seat held by C. A. Bertrand, former attorney-general, Berthier, held by Cleophas Bastien, and Bagot, held by Cyrille Dumaine, former minister without portfolio.

In all three cases, elected members won out by slim margins.

In Laurier, the former attorney-general, after two recounts, was de-

clared elected over his Union National opponent, Dr. Zenon Hardy Lesage, by 14 votes.

The suit seeking disqualification of Mr. Bertrand charges the former attorney-general used his office to have illegally placed at the disposition of former provincial Police Chief Louis Jarguile the sum of \$10,000 for the engagement of "special constables" who, he charged, largely contributed to the commission of fraudulent electoral manoeuvres.

J. A. Barette, notary, launched proceedings against Mr. Bastien in Berthier, claiming void ballots were erroneously attributed to the former minister without portfolio.
