WALLACEBURG, Ont., March
9 — Handicraft training in the
Scouts during boyhood has en-
abled L-Cpl. Errey's father re-

Fine Concert Given By
Trapp Family Singers
Von Trapp Family
Exiles From Their
Ancestral Estate
"When I landed with my family
in New York five years ago, I
thought I was in Heaven." So
said George Von Trapp told a Guardian
representative yesterday. "It had
been so long since I had been the
master of my own actions, I had
almost come to accept my fears
that I should never be a free man
again."

Baroness Maria von Trapp with
her seven daughters in the
picturesque costumes of their native
Austria sang unaccompanied or
to the accompaniment of the spinet
and wood instruments of Eliza-
bethan days, with their simple
and rustic director, Dr. Franz
Wagner adding upon occasion a fine
flourish to their harmonies. While
Dr. Wagner was the performer on
the spinet a number of the girls
showed their skills on recorders.
The Baroness, speaking excellent
English, introduced Baron von
Trapp and the ensemble individu-
ally, and gave an apt explanation
to several numbers of the program.

Opening Numbers
Of exceptional beauty was the
early religious music which com-
pleted the opening group of songs,
beginning with a composition by
the great 16th century Italian
composer, Giovanni Pierluigi da
Palestrina. Palestrina wrote a
whole book of motets designed, like
his offertory, for use throughout
the Mass. The first of these, "The
Mass," was followed by a setting
of the "Agnus Dei" by another
Venetian composer and organist
who incidentally, was the teacher
of the Galuppi returned to his
father's home in Treviso.
The original to enlist
