The police on searching the house not only found opium but a supply of liquor. In court today the prisoners were remanded.

—"KENSINGTON DAIRYING ASSOCIATION.—The present season promises to be a record one in the history of the Kensington Dairying Association. With an abundant supply of milk and good prices for cheese the farmers are expecting good returns. The total increase in the quantity of milk received up to September 30th over last year was 236486 lbs. The Association has already sold 266815 lbs. cheese for 047781.19 cents an average of 17.9 cents per lb. The average selling price per lb. cheese last year was 13.71 cents for which the patrons received an average of \$1.08 cents per cwt of milk. Notwithstanding an increase in the cost of supplies for manufacturing of about 35 per cent last year the Association expects to pay the patrons from \$1.40 cents to \$1.50 cents per hundred lbs. of milk. The season continues into the month of November this year."

**Shot by Sentry Off The Dockyard**

HALIFAX, October 22.—Yesterday afternoon at three o'clock, Patrick White, who resides on Lockman St. and employed at the dry dock, was assisting in some work at Evans ferry. In pursuit of his duties, White went off to a boat moored near the northern extremity of the dockyard and started to bail her out.

Scarcely had he commenced his work when he was challenged by a sentry in the Dockyard and commanded to come ashore.

As the ferry proprietor at this joint has permission from the authorities to moor his boats at this point, White took the matter as a joke and locking up saw the soldier with rifle levelled in his direction.

"For the love of Mike be careful with that thing and save your shells to shoot Germans" he said jocularly and stopped to gather another pailful of water. As he did so the sentry fired, the bullet passing through White's instep and out the heel.

Those who witnessed the occurrence agree that there was no dispute between the sentry and White and state that they were amazed at the soldier's action, as it was broad daylight and the time and the unfortunate man was in a moored boat, where he had been placed by other men at the ferry.

White was removed to his home and the wound attended to.

**15,000,000 EGGS SEIZED.**

Italian Authorities Will Sell Them at 3 Cents Each.

ROME, October 23.—The municipal authorities at Milan have seized 100 cars containing 15,000,000 eggs as the result of a campaign to prevent speculation. Milan, Rome, and other centres have been eggless for the week notwithstanding the existence of immense stocks.

It is expected that the Government will fix a uniform price of 3 cents throughout Italy and seize and sell all eggs at this price.

**ENGLISHMAN SENTENCED.**

LONDON, Oct. 23.—Reuter's Amsterdam correspondent says it is reported on good authority that Dr. Bull, a wealthy English dentist, has been sentenced in Belgium to imprisonment for six years on the charge of treason. A London despatch last week said fourteen persons, one of them Dr. Bull, were to be court-martialed at Brussels. Dr. Bull was charged with having provided funds for Miss Edith Cavell, the English nurse who was put to death by the German authorities at Brussels, to assist in the escape of Belgian soldiers.
