St. Patrick's Day Celebration Here

(Continued from page one)

Then, after explaining that St. Patrick's call to preach the Gospel was but a renewal of the call of the first twelve apostles, the preacher spoke of the impression which he left on the Irish people to whom he was sent. His name, venerated and loved by the Celtic heart, has been handed down from generation to generation, and to-day as on the 17th of March during so many centuries, wherever a band of Erin's children are gathered together there the name of St. Patrick is blessed and praised in song and speech and prayer to-day.

Then commenting on the life of the saint, he emphasized especially his spirit of faith and prayer. Love of the faith and labour for it, he said, make up the history of his whole life. Then dealing with the different periods of his life, Dr. McGuigan eloquently described his early hardships under a foreign master, his subsequent studies and finally his consecration as Bishop with the apostolic mission to preach the Gospel in his chosen land of love. Then speaking of the work in Ireland, the preacher said that he left his own deep faith on the people whom he loved. Churches and monasteries where God's praises were sweetly sung and Christ's counsels nobly followed, sprung up all over that fair and happy land. Touching, too, on the sorrows of Ireland and what she suffered for her faith, the Doctor said that she received the martyr's crown, for hoping almost against hope, she clung with unflinching loyalty to St. Patrick's teachings and to Holy Faith.

The Doctor concluded by an eloquent appeal for the zealous preservation of the faith, of Catholic ideals and principles amid the scepticism and materialism of the modern world. The peroration was about as follows: My dear brethren, need I then point out the lesson of this morning's feast? Stand faster in the faith of your fathers, for we are the children of the saints, and we look for that life which God has promised to those who never change their faith from Him. Let us love holy faith with the zeal of St. Patrick, let us guard it as the apple of our eye. Let us cherish this gift better than life; let us, if need be, seal it by our own life's blood. Cherish it, then as St. Patrick did, by piety and by prayer, and these will inspire you with a filial love for God—a filial love for your Divine Master—a filial love for His voice speaking through His Church. Clave, then with the whole energy of your soul to every article of your faith, for they are vouchsafed for by the eternal truth of the All-living God. And, dear friends, when you are tempted to follow the ways of the world, when the spirit of contention and strife and intellectual pride strives to win you from Holy
