THE LIBERAL UNIONIST PARTY.

The Liberal Unionist party in the United Kingdom grew out of the secession of a number of prominent Liberals when Mr. Gladstone took up the advocacy of Home Rule for Ireland. These seceders united with the Conservative party and formed the Liberal Unionist party. It was after the same fashion that the Liberal Conservative party was formed in Canada to establish and maintain the union of the Provinces. It was charged here that the coalition so formed ought to have been dissolved when the Confederation was accomplished, and that those former Liberals, who remained under the leadership of Sir John Macdonald and his successors had really become Conservatives. The same charge is made with regard to the former British Liberals who have served so long under Salisbury and Balfour. They have practically become Conservatives partly by association and partly by that tendency toward greater conservatism of thought and action which comes to most men with advancing years. In fact one hears little of Liberal Unionism at election times in Britain except in those constituencies where there is a strong Liberal sentiment and the Conservative candidate poses as a Liberal Unionist in the hope of bettering his chances.

The Duke of Devonshire, long the recognized leader of the Liberal Unionist party, now desires that it shall be dis-

solved, and that the Liberal Unionists shall be free to go where they choose on the protectionist issue raised by Mr. Chamberlain. The latter is not willing to lose the advantage of the organization and challenges the Duke to take a vote of the party on the proposed dissolution and to abide by the will of the majority. This would give the protectionists, if they won, the immense advantage of the "machine," of which Mr. Chamberlain knows the full value. On the other hand the dissolution of the coalition which has been dominant so long would add to the confusion and chaotic condition to which the politics of the United Kingdom has been reduced.

Councillor Stewart as Chairman of the Police Committee and as a Councillor rendered such good service to the city as to merit his return to the new Council. He is conducting an energetic canvass, with good prospects.

Ex-President J. A. Messervy of the Board of Trade is being solicited to become a candidate for the Councillorship in Ward One. Should he consent, no more useful or influential representative for the ward could well be found.

T. B. Riley is very favorably mentioned as a candidate for the Councillorship of Ward Two. Should he consent to accept a nomination he would undoubtedly receive the support of the better elements of the ward. It is due to Ward Two that the electors shall have the privilege of supporting a law-abiding candidate of ability and influence.

An Ottawa despatch tells that Hon. H. R. Emmerson has been sworn in as Minister of Railways and that Hon. Mr. Bernier, who had been Minister of Inland Revenue since 1900 has resigned that position and will probably be succeeded therein by Mr. Brodeur, now Speaker of the Commons. Mr. Emmerson is fifty years of age and for some years successfully led the provincial government of New Brunswick as Premier. He has been in political life since 1887. His appointment to the important department of Railways will give good satisfaction in New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island where the new minister is favorably known. New Brunswick is fortunate in securing two such prominent federal positions as the Chairmanship of the Railway Commission and the Ministry of Railways. It is hardly probable that Mr. Emmerson will be opposed on seeking re-election in Westmorland under the circumstances.

Such accidents as have happened through negligence in this respect, as illustrated so forcibly recently should impress the city with the importance of the appointment of an inspector for this class of work. When the loss of property arising from defects in this class of work is taken into consideration, the Insurance underwriters can hardly be blamed for pressing the matter or increasing the rates as an alternative.
