U. S. President Declares Stand Of Hop On Stabilization Ended

Roosevelt Sees No Utility In Temporary Stabilization Of World Currencies; Not Of Immediate Concern.

LONDON, July 5.—The text of the statement handed to the Secretary-General of the League of Nations in London today concerning the stand of the United States in connection with the World Monetary and Economic Conference follows:

"The President has made it clear that he saw no utility at the present time in temporary stabilization between currencies of countries whose needs and policies are not necessarily the same.

"Such stabilization would be artificial and unreal and might hamper individual countries in realizing policies essential to their domestic problems.

"He urged the conference to seek consideration of its fundamental tasks of facilitating policies by the different nations directly, not temporary expedients but to mitigating and, if possible, remedying the harassing evils of the present economic situation.

Hopes to be Help

"In the hope that the United States may be of help to the Conference, to whose success and friendly cooperation the President continues to attach the greatest importance, it may be useful that we should develop this thought somewhat more fully.

"Revaluation of the dollar in terms of American commodities is an end from which the government and people of the United States cannot be diverted.

"We wish to make this perfectly clear. We are interested in American commodity prices. What is to be the value of the dollar in terms of foreign currencies is not and cannot be our immediate concern.

"The exchange value of the dollar will ultimately depend upon the success of other nations in raising the prices of their own commodities in terms of their national money, and cannot be determined in advance of our knowledge of such fact.

Nothing Inimical

"There is nothing in our policy inimical to the interests of any other country and we are confident that no other country would seek to embarrass us in the attainment

Balbo, Leader of Flight, Expects to Remain in Reykjavik Several Days.

REYKJAVIK, Iceland, July 5.—(A.P.)—The Italian aerial squadron of 24 seaplanes arrived here late today from Londonderry, Northern Ireland, completing the third leg of a projected seven-stop flight from Orbetello, Italy, to Chicago by way of Eastern Canada.

The planes came down on the Ford here at 4:55 p. m. local time 11:55 p. m. E.S.T., seven hours and 15 minutes after the take-off started at the northern tip of Ireland, a distance of 930 miles.

There were 24 motorboats, each carrying three tons of benzine for the flying ships, anchored in the inlet to greet the armada, headed by the Italian aviation Minister, General Italo Balbo.

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BESSBOROUGH ON NOVA SCOTIA TOUR

Governor General Sees Strengthening of Bonds of Empire in Canada.

ANNAPOLIS ROYAL, N. S., July 5.—Strengthening bonds of Empire are clearly evident in Canada, His Excellency the Earl of Bessborough told citizens of this old Acadian town as he paused today along the route of his Nova Scotia tour. Speaking to descendants of British and French ancestors who struggled centuries ago for possession of the ground on which he stood, Canada's Governor-General pointed to their present unity under one flag. "And it is only natural," he added, "that those who live in a town whose history links it so closely with the British Crown should be always mindful of the union which that crown symbolizes.

"As the representative of His Majesty the King, I find wherever I go in Canada increasing evidence of the strength of the ties which bind this Dominion to the other units composing the British Empire."

Centrist Party In Germany Dissolves

BERLIN, July 5.—(A.P.)—Former Chancellor Heinrich Brüning announced tonight the dissolution of the Catholic Centrist party, last non-Nazi political party in Germany.

A laconic statement issued by him said: "The Centrist party has dissolved itself in agreement with the Chancellor (Hitler)."

The extinction of the Centrists marks the end of the parliamentary party system in Germany as well as the end of political Catholicism. The Bavarian Populists, allies of the Centrists, quit the political scene yesterday. Between them these parties held 88 of 584 seats in the pre-Hitler Parliament.

The Volkspartei, or Peoples Party of the late Chancellor Gustav Stresemann, which had only two Reichstag seats but was formerly much more powerful, also announced its dissolution yesterday.

Tentative Truce At Wheat Parley

"Big Four" Agree In Principle On Production. Seek Co-operation Of Smaller Exporting Countries

LONDON, July 5.—(C.P. Cable)—The four greatest wheat-exporting nations of the world having agreed that production and exporting of the product must be made to fit the demand, if the price is to be raised, are now going after the smaller exporters and the big importers to see how much co-operation they can get. If they can't get enough, in all probability the four-power scheme will necessarily be dropped.

After many months of negotiations the Wheat Conference consisting of Canada, Australia, the United States and the Argentine, announced today they were "agreed in principle" on a policy of "temporary adjustment of production and trade to world demand with a view to improving the price of wheat and liquidating surplus stocks now hanging on the market."

Two Escaped Convicts Are Sent Back To Prison

Sentenced to Five and Three Years Respectively—Death of Third a Mystery.

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, July 5.—Recaptured after a dramatic manhunt in the Savannah forest, two escaped convicts were sent to prison today while police investigated the death of their companion.

Joseph Bango, last of the trio to be found, was sentenced to serve five years; Gabriel Castillo, three years. The third, James Hinds, was found dead with a wound over his heart, in the woods not far from where Castillo was recaptured.

Priest Dies From Hatchet Wounds

MARTINS FERRY, O., July 5.—The Rev. Pathenos Colonis, 72, pastor of the Martin's Ferry Greek Orthodox Catholic Church, died today from hatchet-inflicted wounds. He was found unconscious in the basement of the church Saturday night, his skull fractured by blows from the blunt and sharp edges of a blood-stained hatchet.

New Low In Temperature

BOSTON, July 5.—(A.P.)—An all time low temperature record for this date was established today when the U. S. Weather Bureau reported a reading of 52 degrees at 6 a. m. At midday it had moved up only seven degrees.

Women brought out furs and men donned their topcoats. In office buildings steam was turned on and in many homes coal bins were scraped for fuel. Warmer weather was predicted for tomorrow.

Restoration Fund Drive A Success

WINNIPEG, July 5.—More than \$320,000 in cash has been subscribed already this year to the restoration fund drive of the Church of England in Canada. It was announced today, and the widows' and orphans' fund and the clergy superannuation fund have been restored in full and invested.

INDUSTRIAL EXPANSION IS NOTED

Greater Activity in Heavy Industries And Luxury Goods Seen.

TORONTO, July 5.—"The expansion in industrial production broadened during June so as to include a greater number of trades, thereby offsetting a seasonal decline in some which were among the first to record improvement," says the monthly commercial letter of the Canadian Bank of Commerce.

"The heavy industries, invariably the last to share in a general upturn, have become slightly more active, as also have numerous small manufacturers of special or luxury goods, while the volume of new orders offered the textile mills have been beyond the capacity of several units to execute promptly. With greater seasonal activity than a year ago, the automobile industry now has a better production record for the second quarter of the year than for the like period of 1932. What effect the recent lowering of crop prospects will have upon general industry is not yet determinable," the letter says.

Nova Scotia Schooner Goes Aground

HALIFAX, July 5.—(C.P.)—The schooner Frederick H., wrecked today on Silver Bank Rocks, carried a crew of about eight men. After an overhauling she sailed on May 3; from Porth Greville, N. S., for Turk's Island.

Owned by Kenneth S. Cochran, of Porth Greville, the Frederick H. is a three-masted vessel with a registered tonnage of 390 tons. She was built in Nova Scotia 3 years ago.

Of later years she had been used in the lumber carrying trade. On her present voyage she was travelling in ballast to load at Turk's Island.

STATESMEN OF EMPIRE MAY MEET

Unbreakable Deadlock On Stabilization

Steering Committee Of Conference May Remain Semi Permanent Body.

LONDON, July 6.—(Thursday)—(Canadian Press Cable)—The World Economic Conference, scarcely four weeks old, will suspend activities today, beaten for the moment by an irreconcilable difference between monetary policies of the United States and Europe's gold-bloc countries, led by France.

After night-long conferences American and gold country leaders decided early today there was no useful purpose to be served by continuing parleys under present unpropitious circumstances.

A resolution will be presented before the steering committee later today asking a recess, probably for two months.

The final scenes of this session of the conference will take place at a plenary session, tomorrow or Saturday, and most of the delegates will go home.

Blaze Threatens Summer Home Of McKenzie King

OTTAWA, July 5.—(C.P.)—Summer residents of Kingsmere in the Gatineau Hills near here, rallied a volunteer fire brigade today and saved from destruction the beautiful country residence of Rt. Hon. Mackenzie King, leader of the Opposition and former Prime Minister of Canada. Sparks from an incinerator ignited the grass and two large pine trees overshadowing the house were set ablaze. A score of neighbors assisted Mr. King's household in saturating the building and extinguishing the shower of blazing embers that fell upon the roof. The buildings were undamaged.

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Gov. Efforts Seen As A Success

OTTAWA, July 5.—It was learned today, unofficially, that the government's efforts to reduce the public service costs by \$14,000,000 during the present fiscal year, would be successful to the extent of two-thirds of that amount at least, if not the whole, and without any drastic steps along the lines of retrenchments or dismissals.

Ex Maritimers On Homeward Trek

MONCTON, July 5.—The Boston train leaving the C. N. R. station at Moncton this afternoon carried a large number of ex-Maritimers homeward to Boston from the coach excursion operated over the national holiday in the United States, Independence Day, to the Maritime Provinces.

Boyd Off On Long Flight

PORT AU PRINCE, Haiti, July 5.—(A.P.)—Captain Errol Boyd, Toronto airman of trans-Atlantic fame, and co-pilot Robert Lyons look off at 6:20 p. m. (E.S.T.) today in the veteran plane Columbia for a non-stop flight to Washington, D. C.

Boyd, who crossed the Atlantic in the Columbia and landed on the west coast of Britain some years ago, said he expected to reach Washington in about 16 or 17 hours. He is carrying a letter and a gift of coffee from President Vincent of Haiti to President Roosevelt.
