SILVER SITUATION BECOMES SERIOUS
(Special to The Guardian.)
OTTAWA, Dec. 10.—Discovering that considerable Canadian silver coin has been melted and converted into bullion, the Royal Mint has been running nearly to capacity lately to make good the inroads made on the currency at the present price of \$1.33 1/2 an ounce for silver bars in New York. It is not regarded as profitable to melt Canadian coins, silver experts stating that there is no profit in melting coins unless the price is more than \$1.33 or \$1.34 an ounce. But the price has been up as high as \$1.39 and American melters have been encouraged by the fact that they can buy one dollar's worth of Canadian coins for 96 cents in American money and that Canadian coins are more productive of silver than American ones. The fineness of the coins in Canada is placed at 925 white in the United States it is only 900. After this year the difference in fineness will probably disappear.
Sir Henry Brayton, asked about the situation, said that it was a very serious one.
Had the government any intention of lessening the amount of silver in our currency? he was asked. "I do not think the world would mind very much if it was reduced a little," replied Sir Henry. "The fineness of silver in our coins is 925 and in the United States 900. To reduce the fineness a little would not affect the value of our coins. However, the fineness is fixed for this year and the content is a crime to melt Canadian coins but the punishment is avoided by shipping the coins to the United States outside of our jurisdiction."
