

THE AEROPLANE FLIES AS A BIRD FLIES

No Motor is Used, the Operator Working the Wings With His Hands and Feet

SAN FRANCISCO, April 2.—Professor John Montgomery's aeroplane was tested conclusively Monday night at San Jose and a successful flight was made in it by John Maloney, an expert aeronaut. Montgomery is professor of science in Santa Clara Catholic College, and has been experimenting on flying machines for several years. Now he has completed a machine which can be guided and which flies with no use of motor or gas. Maloney last night took the machine up to a height of 3,000 feet by means of a hot air balloon. Then the aeroplane was released and it sailed above the city for half an hour and finally landed at Montgomery's workshop. The machine which is called Santa

Clara looks like a huge bird. The frame is of spruce timber, very tough and supple, and the wings are of forfeited canvas. There are eight of these wings and each is shaped like an isosceles triangle out across the point. In each wing there is an upward curve constructed with the same concavity that is to be found in the wings of birds. The operator sits on a saddle and the wings are worked partly by hands and partly by feet by means of stirrups and steel shafts. Steel wires preserve the shape of the wings and the guiding is done from the back. Soaring at six miles an hour the aeroplane could be stopped and turned within forty feet. A contrary wind appears to make little difference in speed.

A CANADIAN BOY CONFESSES HIS CRIME

He Says He Murdered a Fellow Tramp in Maine in 1897—Belongs to London, Ont.

LONDON, April 2.—A story is told in the San Francisco Examiner of March 21 that a tramp giving his name as Earl Roy Bodine and his home as London, Ont., had confessed to Evangelist J. L. Mc-

Comb, in Oakland, that he had murdered a fellow tramp in Maine in 1897. Bodine is 25 years old and had been a tramp for eight years, ever since he ran away from London. He had a quarrel with the tramp referred to, whose name he never knew, shot him with a revolver and threw his body into the Aroostook River. He had ever since been a victim of remorse, but after meeting with the evangelist he confessed his crime, and, having made up his mind to live a new life, he surrendered to the police at Oakland, Calif. He says he is a son of Marshall Bodine of 110 Clearance street, this city, was seen yesterday and confirmed the story that Earl Roy Bodine is a Londoner. The family formerly lived on Simcoe St., as the young man stated. "The boy's mother is dead," said Mrs. Bodine, his step-mother, "and he has been a rover for seven or eight years. He was home about two years ago." Mrs. Bodine continued, "but we have not heard from him since." Young Bodine's parents here are respectable. A sister of the young man is married and living in St. Thomas, and another sister is a trained nurse. One brother is in the United States.

RUSSIAN TERRORISTS HAVE CONDEMNED 30

Plot to Kill Governor Trepoff Frustrated Yesterday—Campaign of Terror Baffles the Russian Police.

St. Petersburg, April 1.—The authorities continue to find evidence of terrorist activity in St. Petersburg and in spite of the precautions of the police, another tragedy may occur at any moment. The fighting organization is known to have on its condemned list thirty persons, headed by Grand Duke Alexis and Governor General Trepoff, but the police, although they have arrested several persons with bombs in their possession and have taken many suspects into custody, have been completely baffled in their efforts to discover the invisible hand which is directing the campaign of the terrorists. The police theory continues to be that the local organizations of those engaged in the conspiracies are at Geneva and Paris, and that the men arrested in Russia are agents selected to execute the sentences. When arrested these agents invariably are true to their oaths and refuse to divulge anything, no matter to what ordeal they are subjected. Yesterday the police by chance failed what is believed to have been a plot to kill Governor General Trepoff. According to the latest details of the affair, a man was observed during the morning loitering at the corner of Great Morskain

street, about a block away from the entrance to General Trepoff's chancellery. The man attracted no attention at first as he wore the red cap which is the distinctive mark of the employees of the messenger company whose messengers stand at every street corner. But at last a policeman, noticing that the man's face was not familiar to him, approached the supposed messenger with the object of interrogating him. The man thereupon became alarmed and drew a revolver and fired at the policeman but missed him. The policeman then overpowered his assailant and arrested him. Almost at the same hour that the biggest messenger was being arrested on Great Morskain street, the police who have been keeping a sharp lookout at the hotels and lodging resorts, discovered several bombs of the terrorist pattern in a trunk belonging to a stranger who occupied a furnished room in a house in Pushkin, but who was absent at the time the police searched his apartments. The man was promptly taken into custody when he returned and last night, two individuals who called to see him were arrested. All the prisoners declined to give any account of themselves.

CITY OF CALGARY WANTS PUBLIC LIGHTING

A Municipal Plant is to be Installed Immediately.

CALGARY, N. W. T., April 1.—The City Council has taken final action in establishing municipal ownership of the lighting plant, when tenders were opened, and R. S. Kesch, of Montreal, was designated as a consulting engineer to determine which of three bids should be considered most economical. The climax came after the most strenuous objection from the forces of the Calgary Lighting & Water Power Company, which has steadily offered to reduce its price of light since the municipal ownership idea was advanced. The civic committee reported in favor of accepting a com-

promise with the private company and abandoning, at least for five years, the civic project. This was rejected. The Council Chamber was crowded and cheers greeted this concluding decision to go ahead with the work. Competent engineers have declared that Calgary can install for sixty thousand dollars the plant required for both domestic and street lighting. The anger of the people has been aroused over the actions and arbitrary conduct of the private company, rated by a syndicate of Eau Claire men, who have made enormous sums out of supplying light and power in Calgary for years.

GAVE UP HIS LIFE TO PROVIDE FOR FAMILY

Pathetic Story From the Far North—Robert McNeill Died in Lonely Hut.

TORONTO, April 1.—A pathetic story comes from the frozen north of the head waters of the Stewart River, hidden in the will of Robert McNeill. Some time ago McNeill left for the north and made a considerable fortune prospecting and mining. Dur-

ing a long winter night he died and lately his body was discovered in his lonely hut. Finding the end coming he had scrawled by the light of an oil taper, his will, on a piece of birch-bark, leaving all his possessions to his family in Ontario, to provide for whom he had given up his life.

ANOTHER SEALER ARRIVES

St. John's Nfld., March 30.—The steamer Kite, fully loaded with 10,000 seals, arrived here to-day, but has no reports of new catches by other vessels of the sealing fleet. It is feared the fishery this year will fall well below the average. Sealers who have recently returned here report the ocean covered with ice. The weather has been severe, 150 men of the sealing fleet being badly frozen during the extreme cold.

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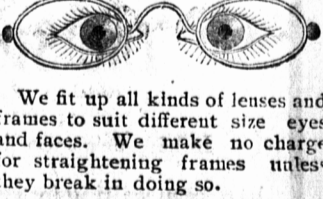
