GEORGE THE FOURTH'S RUM DRINK

2 quarts of rum.
1 lb of loaf sugar.
1 nutmeg.
1 pint maraschino.
1 pint Madeira.
1 pint boiling milk.
The peel of 12 lemons.
The peel of 2 Saville oranges.
2 quarts of spring water, cold.
1 pint lemon juice.
1 pint strong green tea.

A CLARET DRINK

Mix a bottle of claret and a bottle of soft water together, add a small glass of brandy and sugar to taste and a lump of ice.

A DELICIOUS SUMMER DRINK

Take 2 washed and dried lemons, 2 lbs. powdered loaf sugar, 1 quart of white wine, 3 quarts of quinine, fresh boiling milk. Peel the lemons very thinly, squeeze out the juice over it and let peal soak in it all night. Next morning add the sugar, the wine, and the boiling milk. Strain through a jelly bag till quite clear. Then set on ice.
