immigration from all countries except Canada. It would be better for Canada's growth if the exception in her favor had not been made, although the preference shows a just appreciation of Canadians as most desirable citizens.

In procuring immigrant settlers and keeping them Canada's chief obstacle is her long, cold winters. We who are acclimated find the winters enjoyable and healthful, but many immigrants from warmer lands have a dread of the Canadian winters. And how many thousands of native born Canadians who can afford to do so spend the mid-winter season and much of their money in the south. It is also true that, other things being equal, it costs more to keep a home, operate a factory, or a railway in a cold country than in a warmer one.

Another thing that increases the cost of living in Canada is the want of coal in the six provinces between Nova Scotia and Alberta. Two-thirds of the Canadian people spread over a distance of nearly three thousand miles live in the coalless provinces.

Canada is a great country, vastly rich in natural resources and has bright prospects, but when we come to consider the question of getting new settlers and keeping them in the country and preventing the migration of our native born sons and daughters to the south we must look the facts squarely in the face and it is folly to ignore them. Canada is the one coldest country which is eagerly seeking for immigrants.

Premier Ferguson is again in luck in securing the election of a third candidate, this time in Northern Essex by acclamation. If he can get 64 more on polling day it will give him a wet majority in the new Legislature.

The seizure of many smuggled motor cars in Canada, including a considerable number in the Maritimes, gives a glimpse of the manner in which the public revenues has been defrauded for years in this line. It has greatly increased with the growth of tourist business across the border. It is effected under many devices, one of the most frequent being where the American tourist secures a permit to enter Canada with his car for a brief period and then sells the

ing of his foxes in the adjoining ranch up till the evening previous to his death. During the night he complained of a pain in his head and chest but after home remedies had been applied he obtained relief and slept comfortably until seven o'clock, when he had a slight recurrence of the attack, but nothing alarming although a physician was immediately sent for and in a few minutes he was apparently as well as usual. At nine o'clock while chatting with his family and holding his little son in his arms he was seized with a third attack which proved fatal although everything possible was done to restore him. Doctors Stewart, Champion and Keir being in attendance it was unavailing the spark of life had flown and his spirit had returned to God who gave it.

The late Mr. McNeill was a man of high moral integrity, broad minded, generous in the support of the church and every worthy object that was brought to his notice, courteous and pleasing in his manner and address, filling a large place in our community life, his loss is deeply deplored by one and all. But in his own home where he was a devoted husband, a most affectionate and indulgent parent, the grief and aching void caused by his sudden removal from their midst can only be effaced by the healing hand of time.

Born on October 24th, 1867 near Tyne Valley, he later with his parents resided at McNeill's Mills and although not having all the advantages at hand for securing a good education yet by his indomitable will and perseverance he was able to overcome all difficulties and moved to a position of prominence and affluence. When a young man in his early twenties he and his brother, William carried on a milling business at West Devon. He went from there to Gaspe where for a time he was in the employ of the Gaspe Lumber Co., eventually buying out the interest of the other members of the company and for a number of years carried on a large and successful lumbering, mercantile and shipping business there which he sold out later to an English firm owned by Mr. J. W. Brown which he continued to operate up till the time of his death. He was also owner of a large fox ranch in Tyne Valley and was organizer and manager of the R. McNeill Fox Co., at McNeill's Mills. He is survived by his sorrowing wife, formerly Miss Sophia Gardner of Northam, four sons: Milton, Carmen, Wendal and Frederick and two daughters, Beatrice and Doris who will miss an affectionate father's tender care and guidance, also four brothers: William at West Devon, John at McNeill's Mills, Rev. F. C. McNeill of Mettawankeag, Maine, and Rev. Charles McNeill of Edmonton, Alberta and four sisters: Mrs. John Milligan, McNeill's Mills, Mrs. (Rev.) Oscar Perry, New Hampshire, Mrs. Oscar Perry, Boston and Mrs. William Clark of Millinocket, Maine, who mourn his death while still in the prime and vigor of life and to whom the sympathy of all goes out at this time of their great sorrow.

On Sabbath afternoon Oct. 24th the funeral services were conducted at his late residence by the Rev. Bruce Carew, pastor of the United Church assisted by Rev. Mr. Brown and Rev. Coleman, after which the remains were conveyed to the cemetery near by followed by one of the largest funeral processions ever seen in this locality, friends coming from all parts of the Province to pay their last tribute of respect to one whom they had esteemed worthy of the honor bestowed upon him. The sad and solemn obsequies at the grave being ended all that was mortal was tenderly committed to mother earth.
