IMPROVEMENT TO THEATRE.—The new porch at the entrance to the Prince Edward Theatre is now completed and presents a splendid appearance, as well as being a decided boon to the theatre in the winter months. It is regrettable to note that the very day after the work was completed some vandals smashed in a plate glass pane in one of the doors.

LARGE MARKET.—There was a large market yesterday. Pork was plentiful the highest price paid by the buyers being the same as on the previous market day—14 1/2c net pound, for best quality. The inside of the market building was well stocked with poultry for which those in charge asked the following prices in the forenoon: Geese from \$1.80 to \$3.25 each; turkeys from \$2.50 to \$4.50 each; chickens and fowls from 60c to \$1.35 each. Eggs retailed from 40 to 45c, and butter from 40c to 43c per pound. The prices being paid by wholesalers is as follows: Geese 13c per pound; ducks the same; turkeys 25c; fowl 12 to 14c; chickens 13 to 18c.

ANNUAL MEETING.—The annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Bible Society was held in the Y. M. C. A., Charlottetown yesterday afternoon the President being in the Chair. Several of the clergymen and laymen of the different Protestant churches were present. The energetic Secretary, Principal J. D. Seaman read the minutes of last meeting and gave an account of his work, visiting a number of branches last July and August. There are 34 active branches in this province whose members are doing excellent work for the Society. It was moved and carried that all the officers of the Charlottetown Bible Society be nominated to be reelected, and that a letter be drafted to the British and foreign Bible Society in memory of the valued and life long service of the late Honorary President Mr. H. J. Cundall, who died during the past summer. The collectors of the different branches are now making their calls upon the subscribers. The expenses are much heavier this year owing to increase in prices of material and also the large numbers of Testaments in khaki covers given to our brave soldier lads going overseas. It may not be generally known that any one contributing \$20.00 becomes a life member of the Society and certificate given to that effect. One gentleman has already given \$50 to the Charlottetown branch, recently to help on the great work of the Bible Society. The annual church meeting of the Charlottetown Association will be held Thursday, January the 4th next in Grace Church during the week of prayer, when the Rev. Mr. Boyer of New Brunswick and Dr. Heine of St. John will give short addresses.

### ALLIED SHIPPING WARNED AGAINST A GERMAN RAIDER.

NEW YORK, Dec. 19.—Another warning to shipping of the Entente Allies to be on guard against a Ger-

man raider on this side of the Atlantic was sent out tonight by a British cruiser off Sandy Hook. The wireless message was very largely a repetition of the one flashed a week ago, and contained no new information as to the character of locality of the supposed raider. It was considered in marine circles to be in the nature of a precaution.

### GERMAN PLANS THAT WILL BE SPOILED BY ALLIES.

AMSTERDAM, via London, Dec. 19.—The Vossische Zeitung says that a territorial re-arrangement based on the idea of independence of Roumania is no longer to be considered. This statement, which is based upon information from well informed circles is followed by a declaration that Russia will receive Moldavia as an equivalent for a considerable territorial sacrifice, which is to be demanded of her.

Poland, the article adds, is to be made independent. Kingdom of Poland is to become a German federal state. Lithuania is to be incorporated in Prussia, Dobruja is to be re-

turned to Bulgaria and Wallachia is to be divided between Austria-Hungary and Bulgaria.
