—ISLAND SOLDIER HAS NARROW ESCAPE.—Strange that many tales the annals of fiction is the story of the remarkable escape from death of Clark Woodside of Malpeque at the battle of Paschendale. Mr. Woodside who is the oldest son of Archie Woodside of Malpeque, same from St. Anne De Bellevue hospital Montreal, to his home in P. E. I. on Friday. He enlisted in the 105th at the age of seventeen and was transferred to the fighting 26th of New Brunswick. He had been at Vimy Ridge and Hill 70 and some minor engagements, through which he went without being wounded, but he certainly got into a hell of sharpnel and machine gun bullets at Paschendale, where he received seven severe wounds, and was laid aside to be buried, but was discovered to be alive. He has spent over two years in hospitals and is not through yet. He has to re-enter the hospital in a short time to get a left arm.—the natural one having been amputated at the shoulder. He has a new nose grafted from the flesh and bone of his forehead. Perhaps the most serious wound of all is a deep one over the heart, which shattered the breast bone. Another one which caused the loss of two toes by a machine gun bullet. He has had twelve operations in all, being seven hours on the table at one time in spite of the gruelling things which he has experienced, he looks well and is right glad to be back again. K

—WOUNDED HERO RETURNS.—Petaer Fredrickson, Oleary, returned from St. Anne De Bellevue Hospital in Montreal on Friday. Mr. Fredrickson who is very young, enlisted in the 105th, and saw much service in the 26th, and saw much service in France. He was at Hill 70, Paschendale, Amiens and Arras. He received a severe wound through the face and jaws at Arras on Sept. 25th, 1918, rendering his right jaw useless. Private Fredrickson is cheerful and glad to be back, notwithstanding his severe wound. K

—ISLANDER DEAD.—The death took place on October 10th, at the residence of his son, Herbert W. Bentley, Alta., of John Birch at the age of 76 years and 6 months. Deceased was born at Port Hill, P. E. Island. He left there about thirty-five years ago for Boston, U. S. A., where he resided until three years and six months ago, when he removed to Alberta. He leaves to mourn one daughter and four sons: Miss Margaret I. and Herbert W. of Bentley, Alta.; Bradford L. of Los Angeles, Cal.; Theodore W. of Lamont, Alta.; and Charles S. of Edmonton, Alta. Also one sister Mrs. Charles Hooper of Schuyler, Nebraska. The deceased was laid to rest in the Bentley Cemetery. The pall bearers were: N. E. Carruthers, R. L. Ramsay, D. M. Reeves, R. R. Hutcheson, J. G. Blish and Wm. Weise. The first three named were formerly natives of P. E. Island.

Hackett of Tignish had passed away in the 20th year of his age. Deceased left St. Dunstan's College a few years ago to regain his usually good health. He endeavoured to again take up his studies this fall but was not equal to the task. He was able to be around until a week before his death. Harold was of a lovable disposition, a dutiful and obedient son, and will be much missed in the family circle. He was popular, industrious and faithful and his companions and associates always lauded his sterling qualities with well deserved praise. He was attended during his illness by Reverend H. J. Mac Dougal. His funeral was held on Tuesday and was led by the members of Division No. 3. A. O. H. It was followed by a numerous concourse to St. Simon and Jude Church, where Requiem High Mass was sung by Rev. A. J. MacDougal while Rev. P. C. Jauthier assisted the choir.
