PROGRESS OF THE WAR.

In the first year of the war the Japanese armies and fleets had achieved a truly marvellous record. They had gained possession and control of Korea, destroyed the Russian fleet in the East, gained half a dozen great battles, captured Port Arthur, Dalny and New Chwang, taken 40,000 prisoners and three hundred guns, inflicted on the Russian army a loss of 100,000 men and destroyed \$400,000,000 worth of Russian public property. The opening of the second year's campaign found them in possession of southern Manchuria, with Kuroki, Oku's, Nodzu's and Nogi's armies facing Karopatin in front of Mukden. The Russian position was strongly entrenched and fortified. But nothing could withstand the determined and persistent onslaught of the eastern-lancers. The greatest battle of the war and the first of the second campaign has resulted in another great victory for Japan.

Karopatin has apparently lost half his effective fighting force in killed, wounded and prisoners, and has been driven forty miles north of Mukden to the Pass, where in advance of his retreat a strong natural position has been fortified for his next stand. The boastful Russian commander, who when he entered upon the Japanese campaign in Manchuria talked of driving the Japanese into the sea and dictating his own terms of peace at Tokio, has been driven by these once despised foes three hundred miles north of Port Arthur. It is more than doubtful whether he can maintain himself where he now is. The Pass is defensible against a frontal attack, but the Russian army is exposed here as at Mukden and Liao Yang to the danger of flanking attacks and of having its communications cut in the rear. Karopatin himself has been superseded in the command, though it may be doubted whether any other Russian commander would have done better than he has done under like conditions.

Should the war go on the present prospects are that the Russian armies will eventually be driven back to Harbin, and that Vladivostok the last Russian port and stronghold in the far East, will share the fate of Port Arthur. Should peace be made it can only be on terms humiliating to the pride and prestige of Russia. Japan has fairly won and in a marvellous fashion, all for which a little more than a year ago she drew the sword. She has astonished all nations and inspired such wholesome respect for her powers and military genius that no power or combination of powers will venture to attempt depriving her of the legitimate fruits of her victory. Russia has learned terrible lessons at home and abroad. Her ruthless aggressions have been sternly checked with a strong hand, and in a most unexpected manner. And we cannot doubt that what has been accomplished by Japan will make for the security and the progress of civilization, and for international peace in the future.

It would apparently suit the Examiner better to have the present Government do nothing toward constructing the tunnel in order that the Conservative party may do the work and gain the resultant glory when they come into power. For our part we have strong hope that the party now in power will build the tunnel. This matter is bigger than politics. And besides the Island cannot afford to wait.

MAINLANDERS ATTENTION!

If the manufacturers, wholesalers and shippers on the Mainland could but realize the fact, they have a strong material interest in assisting us to get the tunnel. There are now 350 car-loads of freight at Pictou awaiting transport to the Island—sufficient to fill two miles of cars. And this notwithstanding the fact that for weeks past the Intercolonial and C. P. R. have refused to accept freight for points on P. E. Island until the ice blockade is broken. If our friends on the Mainland, who have found good paying customers on the Island wish to continue and extend this trade they will do well to join with us in our demand for a tunnel—the only practicable solution of the difficulty. We invite also the attention of the newspapers on the Mainland to this matter, that they may bring to the notice of their friends and patrons these conditions. Moreover the St. John, Halifax, Montreal and Toronto newspapers, some of which circulate largely on the Island, ought to know that owing to the ice blockade their papers do not reach their subscribers in some instances till a month or six weeks after they are printed.

All honor to the citizens of Amherst who meet the hotel men's bluff by opening their homes for the accommodation of travellers. The time is past when a war is necessary to a hotel. We have as good hotels here as they have in Amherst and without wars.

With such a boat as is required what need of a tunnel to carry out the terms of union? asks The Examiner. We shall presently need the boat, which can be built in a few months, till we get the tunnel, which will take years to build. Besides, we have no assurance until it is tried that a new winter steamer will fulfil the terms of union.

CLEARING THE RAILWAY.

Sir.—I was greatly pleased with your suggestion in your issue of Tuesday regarding the widening of the cuttings on the Railway. I have had an opportunity of observing the great mistake made in shovelling the track merely wide enough for the cars. Thus each slight snowfall or even a small ground drift fills in and this snow is pushed ahead of the plow for a few yards until the train sticks solid. If there were a foot of space on each side of the cars there would be enough room for the snow to be pushed aside as the trains moved along. It is a lot better too for the money to be spent here for a little more shovelling rather than to be sent out of the country to purchase more coal to feed the engines to fight snow. Twice as many men should be employed after each storm and thus distribute the money more generally and open the line so much quicker to traffic. This would swell the receipts and accommodate the public. I am surprised to learn that trainmen are not paid for overtime when snow fighting all night. This is a great injustice and the Superintendent should see that it is righted at once. It is all the more creditable to those who push through to their destinations day and night even though they are given the privilege of not doing so. We all appreciate your stand on all public questions especially the tunnel and hope you will continue the good work. If we do not get it will not be your fault and by what we read in the other city papers we will know where to place the blame. The whole country is with you, every farmer and professional and business man, and I talk with scores of them from day to day as I am moving about among them all this time. HUNTER RIVER.
