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Yankees' Rookie, DiMaggio Sparks Team For Big Ball Honors In World Series

NEW YORK, Sept. 20.—(AP)—When the New York Yankees, 1936 World Series contenders, acquired young Joe DiMaggio from the San Francisco Stars for \$75,000 or more, few suspected they were buying the sparkplug for a pennant drive.

Rather, the Yankee partisans figured the Italian youngster from the coast came to the Yankees merely as a batting wonder who would be a one-man show with a ball club going nowhere.

That, or the nucleus for a new Yankee ball club that must be built after the last remnants of old Murderers' Row were gone from the Stadium.

Manager Joe McCarthy, needing to fill the old spot from which Babe Ruth poled his homers, dropped the comparatively inexperienced youngster in there—and presto! he had another fire-eating ball club that is called Murderers' Row just like the slam-bang gang of the Ruthian era.

DiMaggio got away to a bad start. Training camp injuries kept him benched as the season began with the Yankees showing little power.

But when Joe arrived, the club began hitting and went through the American League on a home-run and extra-base-hit spree that rivals the best years of old Murderers' Row and may surpass the best efforts of these Ruth-paced outfits.

While Joe was still getting the feel of the big league willows and learning from roommate Frankie Crosetti about the opposition pitch-

ers, old Tony Lazzeri, the other member of the Yanks' Italian triumvirate, came through in the clutch.

Since then, Tony's batting has fallen off again and he isn't so spry as he used to be, but he's still an important cog in the infield combination of Gehrig, first base, Lazzeri second base, Crosetti short-stop and Red Rolfe third base.

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J. W. Fischer Rallies To Win U.S. Golf Title

GARDEN CITY, N.Y., Sept. 20.—(AP)—John William Fischer, 24-year-old law student at the University of Cincinnati, overcame the handicap of a sprained left ankle and a three-hole deficit, with only eight holes to go, to snatch the United States amateur golf championship Saturday from the grasp of Scotland's Jack McLean.

Just when it looked as if the tall United States Walker Cup star had blown his best chances to overhaul the invader in one of the most erratic title matches ever played, Fischer shot three straight birdies to turn the tables.

He saved the 35th with a sub-par four, squared the match on the 36th with a 10-foot putt for a deuce then captured the 37th and first extra hole by dropping a 20-foot putt for a birdie three.

This sudden and sensational finish by the homebred hope thrilled a gallery of 2,500 spectators, turned back the strongest bid from the British Isles for the title in 25 years and ended a tournament that was almost wrecked by a terrific wind and rain storm during the semi-finals.

McLean's great stand in which he led for more than half the entire route, was the best in this tournament by a British Empire golfer since C. Ross Somerville took the title to Canada in 1932.

A warm sun shone from cloudless skies after a gale that on Friday left the press tent demolished and the course well strewn with debris.

Fischer had the shots, plus the control, when it came down to the final holes, but Johnny came about as close to letting the title go overseas as he possibly could have done.

The former University of Michigan star, who has been knocking at the championship door for a half dozen seasons, finished like a champion, but he can thank his rival's generosity on the greens for an opportunity to do so.

CAN HE SPEAR THEM BOTH?

Mrs. Darling Wins Ladies Golf Title

DIXIE, Que., Sept. 20.—Hitherto a winner of provincial titles only, Mrs. A. B. Darling of Montreal reigned today at the head of Canada's feminine golfers, crowned by virtue of victory in the open championship.

The young matron came off the 15th green of Royal Montreal course Saturday, a winner by 4 and 2 over red-headed Margery Kirkham of Montreal after 34 holes of a scheduled 36-hole final for the crown awarded by defeat of Toronto's Ada MacKenzie.

The Canadian triumph, assured when the finalists eliminated the last United States threats Friday, kept the open title in the Dominion for a fifth successive year. It started Mrs. Darling, acknowledged as one of the longest-driving women of the game, to what she hoped would be a sweep of the open and close, starting tomorrow over Beaconfield gold club layout.

Miss Kirkham, a winner in 1932 and a four-time finalist in six years, was defeated after a thrilling struggle which developed from a forecasted rout following the morning's 18-hole round. Then Mrs. Darling was six up. At the 27th hole—the three-quarter mark, she was only three up.

But Miss Kirkham was not brilliant enough and Mrs. Darling did not falter enough—the last nine to wipe out the deficit. The match ended on the 34th when Miss Kirkham after missing an eight-foot putt, conceded a birdie four.

Giants Increase Lead As Cubs And Cardinals Split Week-end Games

NEW YORK, Sept. 20.—(AP)—Playing at Brooklyn, New York Giants continued their rush toward the National League pennant today and made a complete killing of their Brooklyn jinx by trouncing the Dodgers 5-0, with fat Freddy Fitzsimmons pitching his first shut-out of the year.

The victory gave the Giants a sweep of the three-game series and their seventh straight win over their erstwhile hard-luck "cousins", and apparently made their chances of clinching the pennant at matter of only three or four days.

Boston Bees playing at home overcame the Phillies 5-3 and 6-5 in a doubleheader before a sparse crowd of 7,000 fans.

Bespectacled Danny MacFayden won his 17th victory of the season in the opener.

Bob Smith, veteran relief hurler for the Bees, won the nightcap himself, smashing a single to left field to bring home Gene Moore with the winning run to climax a ninth inning rally.

Chicago Cubs caught up with Dizzy Dean in the eighth inning at Chicago to conquer St. Louis Cardinals 4-3 and moved ahead once more in their argument over second place in the National League, before 32,342 spectators.

The Cubs, who took over second place by winning the series opener Friday, but gave it right back to Frankie Frisch's Gas House Gang yesterday, again moved into the runner-up spot by assaulting the great Dizzy just when it appeared he had his 24th victory of the season in his pocket.

At Pittsburgh Pirates closed their home season before 10,000 fans today with two victories over Cincinnati Reds by 4-1 and 5-4.

Cy Blanton pitched a four-hit game to win the opener and Red Lucas' win in the nightcap made it the fifth consecutive victory for the pirates.

Carl Hubbell stopped the Dodgers at Brooklyn Saturday with four hits for his 15th straight victory, 9-1.

Punch hitter "Ripper" Collins hit a story book home run with the bases loaded in the St. Louis Cardinals' game at Chicago.

Curt Davis, relief pitcher, served the ball that Collins crowned—biggest blow in the 9-6 victory.

A wild throw to the plate with the bases full by Alex Kkamponsin in the 11th inning allowed Lloyd Waner to score and give the Pirates a home 7-5 win over Cincinnati.

Young Bill Weir held the Phillies to four hits as Boston Bees shut out their visitors 5-0.

Louis Favored To Win Over Al Ettore

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 20.—Al Ettore voiced a nice disregard for betting odds and "Joe Louis record today as he wound up his training and snorted, "I'll knock him out."

While workers at the Municipal Stadium prepared for a crowd of 50,000 to see the 15-round battle Tuesday night, just a day short of 10 years since gentleman Gene Tunney cut down the manassa mauler, Jack Dempsey in the same ring, both fighters tapered off in their training camps.

Co-promoter Herman Taylor gleefully figured a \$200,000 "take."

The close-mouthed Louis drew the curtain on his training and said simply and quietly, "I'll win."

The boys on the street say so, currently at 3 to 1. Louis record—24 knockouts, four decisions, and one defeat in 29 professional engagements—seconds it.

But the blonde Ettore exuded confidence and pointed to a record only slightly less impressive than his rival's. The Philadelphian has tagged the knockout punch on 18 opponents, outpointed 37, was held to two draws, lost six decisions, and was knocked out by Charley Retzlaff in January, 1936, in two rounds.

The Philadelphian probably will go into the ring 10 rounds lighter than Louis who should tip the beam at 200.
