FOR THE PUBLIC HEALTH.

All will agree as to the importance of preserving the public health and to this end certain sanitary measures are imperative. Clean streets, alleys, back yards and cellars, the removal of deleterious and offensive matters beyond the confines of the city, and the proper use of the sewerage system may be said to be prime requisites. A number of things to be done in the way of cleaning up the city in the spring it is of the first consequence that they shall be done at the proper time.

We have an excellent sewerage system, so far as it goes, but it does not go far enough. We are informed and believe that there are groups of houses without any connection with the sewers, that are from day to day pouring into blind wells their household waste,—a menace to themselves and their neighbors and to the health of the city—and that on a principal thoroughfare there exists a Chinese laundry, which in violation of a city by law is not in connection with the sewer.

It becomes a matter of public concern to know how many of the condemned blind wells, and cesspools are still allowed to exist. Also what provision, if any our Board of Health has made to have a general and thorough cleaning up, and the removal of all noxious material beyond the precincts of the city. Hitherto the garbage and the manure from the stables have been frequently left till well on in the warm season, awaiting an agricultural demand before their removal.

Are we to continue as heretofore the haphazard, dilatory methods of enforcing the most ordinary and imperative measures for making and keeping our city clean, healthful and sweet? Hitherto in the early part of the warm season our visitors have complained of foul odors as they walked about the city, while if they took a drive into the country they found the highways just beyond the city limits encroached upon by vile smelling manure piles and nuisances of various kinds. Our city has suffered many things alike injurious to its health and reputation from these causes in the past.

Now that we have a competent sanitary officer, and a Board of Health composed of men who ought to take an interest in the public comfort and well-being, were respectfully invite them to begin early, and by energetic and systematic effort endeavor to have the spring cleaning done in proper time and in a thorough manner. It is not enough that parts of the City shall be made clean and put in healthful condition. It is requisite that the slums as well as the better residential quarters shall be put right and kept right.

We have too long tolerated conditions, some of which are indicated above, which are not only a menace to the public health and an outrage upon refined sensibilities but a discredit to the fair fame of the City. The Capital of the Province, the seat of Government and of the Legislature and the Law Courts, ought to be a model of cleanliness and neatness, an example to the other towns, and a source of pride to its people. To make it such we invite the earnest effort and co-operation of the Mayor and Council, the Board of Health and of all concerned. The time has come for a great stride forward in this direction.

TEMPERANCE IN THE MOTHER COUNTRY.

An aspect of the recent general election in the United Kingdom which seems deserving of more attention than it has received on this side of the water, is the bearing which it had upon the temperance movement. The Balfour Government had been in close alliance with the brewing interests who lent it their support, and for whom it legislated. In 1901 the Balfour Government at the instance of the brewers and in spite of the national protest created an annual license into a vested interest.

The effect was to array the temperance forces of the Kingdom in hostility to the Government of the day. The Temperance Manifesto issued by Lady Carlisle and Mr. Hayler on behalf of the League just before the elections makes this sufficiently clear. It said in part: "In the present contest let there be no hesitation or holding back. We are fighting the organized forces of the huge and wealthy liquor traffic, the members of which, sinking all other issues, proclaim as their electoral cry, 'Our Trade Our Politics.'"

The Manifesto proceeded to point out that there were many candidates seeking election who were stalwarts in the temperance cause, and called upon the temperance electors to give them support, that the new House of Commons might be made the strongest temperance Parliament the country had ever seen. We are pleased to learn that the advice seems to have been in accord with the temperance sentiment among the electorate and to have been very generally acted upon.

In the contest it appears the brewers suffered tremendously. Of 33 brewers and distillers who sat in the last Parliament 23 either retired or were defeated. On the other hand almost every one of the Temperance stalwarts in the late Parliament were re-elected, many of them by great majorities. To these are added a number of new members who are committed to temperance legislation. Although the temperance movement in the United Kingdom is yet far behind its position in Canada, it is gratifying to note that it is moving onward and especially that marked progress appears to have been made in the recent general election.

Mr. McLean, M. P. for York has introduced a bill to repeal the indemnity grab and minister's pensions passed last session. It will be interesting to note how other members will vote on this question when it comes to a division.

A number of citizens have subscribed generously toward paying off the mortgage on the Y. M. C. A. Building. Some of the larger subscriptions are made conditional upon the entire amount being raised. Some other citizens are known to intend assisting in the payment, and as something under four hundred dollars remains to be yet subscribed, the Y. M. C. A. management are most desirous that intending subscribers shall place their subscriptions at as early a date as they conveniently can. We trust this may be done and the work so auspiciously begun may be completed.

NEW YORK, March 21.—John D. Rockefeller is at his home in Lakewood, N. J. Several persons have seen him there in the last few days, and he is safe from subpoena server, as the process issued by the supreme court of Missouri is not valid in New Jersey. Unless Attorney General Hadley, of Missouri, should seek to have a commission appointed in New Jersey similar to the one appointed in New York, Mr. Rockefeller is free to come and go anywhere in New Jersey.

Mr. Rockefeller is aware of this, but his employees say he does not show himself often. This some of them attribute to fear of kidnapers. He has recently installed powerful searchlights at his home. The place is guarded by armed men at night, and it is said that they have instructions to shoot any intruder found lurking around the place after nightfall.

Mr. Rockefeller has been seen in his Lakewood home twice this week. A meter inspector met him face to face yesterday while passing through a living room to reach the basement.
