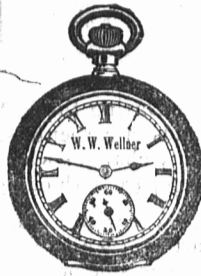

At the evening session, Miss E. Connors taught a primary class. This was one of the most interesting features of the program and showed how a teacher can impress their scholars with Bible truths and draw from them intelligent answers. A carefully prepared paper on "Some of the laws that govern teaching" written by R. B. Murphy was then read. A vote of thanks was tendered the writer and a resolution passed that with his permission it be published in one of the Island Weeklies. Rev. A. Archibald gave a practical and thoughtful address along the line of S. S. Work and put before the convention in clear language the duties and necessary qualifications of a teacher. Rev. Mr. Raymond then gave a few words of encouragement and help, and now that he was leaving he wished to thank one and all for the hearty co-operation which he had received. The President and others spoke words of appreciation in connection with Mr. Raymond's work and of sincere regret on account of his resignation. Meeting was brought to a close by singing "God be With You Till We Meet Again" and benediction by Rev. G. P. Raymond.
