About a Hundred Non-Union Men are at Work

Brakeman Killed Coupling Cars—Miss Flewelling Dead from Injuries—Found Guilty of Manslaughter.

ALL QUIET AT SYDNEY.

SYDNEY, July 7.—(Special)—All is quiet and the strikers have kept away from the works.

About a hundred men are at work but the union workmen declare their ranks intact.

HALIFAX, July 7.—(Special)—Before Judge Townsend and a jury Henry Boutiller was found guilty of manslaughter, with a recommendation to mercy.

SURVIVORS OF THE NORGE.

ABERDEEN, Scotland, July 5.—Seventeen survivors of the wreck of the Danish steamer Norge were landed here tonight by the steam trawler Large Bay. They were picked up from one of the boats of the Norge.

THE JAP FORCES MOVING FORWARD

All Along the Line from Kai Chow to Liao Yang

Russians Making Vigorous Defence—They Capture a Convoy—Japs Capture Nan Tay and Lose Gunboat.

JAPS CAPTURE NAN TAY.

LONDON, July 7.—(Special)—The Japanese swarmed over the mountain crests on Wednesday and advanced on Kai Chow, capturing Nan Tay which the Russians abandoned.

BUT RUSSIANS HOLD KAI CHOW.

The Russians put up a vigorous defence, shelling the Japanese with heavy loss and General Chirikoff still holds Kai Chow.

JAP GUNBOAT BLOWN UP.

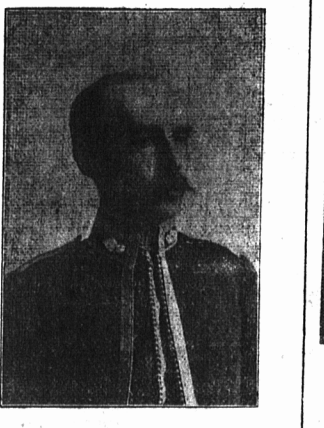
The Japanese gunboat Kaimon struck a mine and sunk at Tai Wau Bay, July 5th.

The Kaimon was a small wooden ship, twenty years old carrying light guns and 230 men.

RUSSIANS CAPTURE A CONVOY.

According to trustworthy reports Major General Mischenko has captured a large convoy of Japanese provisions principally rice and fifty head of cattle.

[Kai Chow, also called Kai Ping, is 150 miles north of Port Arthur on the railway line. Despatches to the afternoon papers also reported fighting at Ta Che Kio, twenty miles further north, where the branch railway from New Chwang joins the main line, and also at a point 25 miles from Liao Yang. These attacks at three points, the extremes being as far as 75 miles apart, show that the rainy season has not yet put a stop to the Japanese forward movement. We may expect these attacks to be followed up with further fighting very shortly. The loss of an old wooden gunboat, sunk by a mine, and of a convoy which was captured by the Russians need not be very seriously regarded.]

THOUSANDS HEAR MILITARY TATTOO

At Victoria Park During Last Evening

The Island Militia does itself Honor in the Inspections—Equal to any in Canada.

Three thousand or more citizens spend a delightful evening, the guests of the Camp of 1904.

The much talked of Tattoo came off most successfully last night. The events had rather long intervals but the numbers themselves were worth waiting for. The cavalry manoeuvres were enjoyed by hundreds of citizens who have no opportunity during the day to see and enjoy such a spectacle.

The cavalry under Captain Macdonald won encomiums from no less a personage than Colonel Lessard, C. B., A. D. C., who honored the tattoo by his presence. The Field Hospital work was an eye opener to many. Without roughness yet with great expedition, supposedly wounded men were gently lifted first rendered and then put on the stretchers ready to be sent back to an imaginary Field Hospital. The drill and marching of this corps is superb.
