mittie on methods of economic co-operation. General recommendations are made in the report. It is recommended that the Imperial Conference take special notice of the need for further radio and film development throughout the Commonwealth. The importance of cultural and educational film and radio production is emphasized.

No recommendation in respect to film distribution is made in the report, and a quota for British films in Canada is not dealt with, it is understood. The sub-committee expresses satisfaction that very great progress has been made in the use of Commonwealth films during the years since the Imperial Conference of 1926, and attributes this to the improvement in quality of the product.

In respect to radio, the report recommends closer liaison between the responsible bodies in control throughout the British Commonwealth, since a drawing together would assist in insuring greater accessibility of radio programmes, it is suggested. No mention of radio equipment is contained in the report, nor does it suggest any plan wealth representatives to the coming world radio conference at Madrid.
