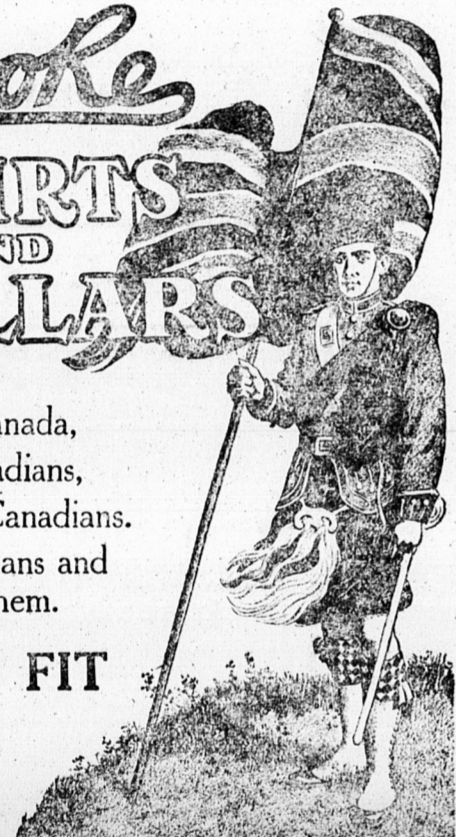

-Thomas Robertson, D. D. S., formerly of Summerside, but now practically in Prince Albert, Sask., arrived in Summerside on Saturday last on a short visit to his mother at North Bedeque, who is seriously ill.-S.

-At the regular meeting of Court Chataqua, I. O. F., Summerside, held on Friday evening last, Nelson Alward, Secty., on behalf of the Supreme Court, presented to Bro. J. D. Goss a beautiful pearl emblematic stick pin known as the Quarter Million Badge which is presented by the Quarter Million Club for success in securing new members.-S.

-The death occurred on Monday last of Peter McDougall an aged and well known resident of Tyne Valley. Mr. McDougall had been making a visit to Robert Milligan, Northam, and while walking along the road near Tyne Valley, suddenly dropped down. He was noticed by a neighbor who at once hastened to his side but when he reached there Mr. McDougall was dead. Death was caused by heart failure. Deceased was eighty-seven years of age and was a well known ship builder. During the past few years he had made his home with his daughters, Mrs. James Ramsay, Tyne Valley and Mrs. Newcomb, Northam. Besides these he leaves to mourn three sons Robert, Russel and Louis, all in Massachusetts, another daughter Mrs. Bowman, resides in Cambridge, Mass. The funeral took place on Wednesday at St. John's Cemetery, Port Hill, and was largely attended, services being conducted by Rev. Henry Harper.-S.

-A meeting of Lots 27-28 Institute was held in the schoolhouse at Albany on March 14th at 7.30 p.m. President Cameron was in the chair and the secretary read a resolution for transportation of the Institute which had been adopted by the Executive Committee of York, the last clause of which called for a Car Ferry at the Capes as a forerunner of the Tunnel. Vice-President Noonan moved its adoption, seconded by Thos. Arnett and carried unanimously. By request of the President Joseph Noonan then gave a description of the Short Course at Truro. By the use of the blackboard he showed how some of the buildings were arranged and how the stock was judged. He strongly emphasized the necessity of keeping the best stock and caring for and feeding them properly. He is to get the best returns for our labor. A hearty vote of thanks moved by Geo. Calbeck and seconded by David McKay was tendered Mr. Noonan and suitably acknowledged. The secretary referred to a circular from Davis & Fraser in which they asked for suggestions from this Institute which would tend to bring about a better understanding between the packers and the farmers. After a lengthy discussion taken part in by the President, W. Arnett, Jos. Noonan, P. C. Lang, Thos. Arnett, Geo. Calbeck and others, it was decided that if the packers would cut down the price of the poor, unfinished hog, instead of reducing the price all round on the good as well as the poor, they would get a far better quality from the farmers and the supply would be better regulated.
