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Latest R.C.A.F. Outlook Of Casualty List Canadian Universities

OTTAWA, Sept. 14.—(CP)—The Royal Canadian Air Force today listed 13 airmen as killed on active service overseas and 14 missing overseas.

Its 269th casualty list of the war contained 33 names. Nine men were reported missing believed killed during air operations overseas and four killed on active service in Canada.

The overseas section of the list also included two men who died of injuries received on active service, two previously missing now reported killed, five prisoners, one previously reported missing now reported a prisoner, and four previously missing now presumed dead.

The "Canada" section also listed one man previously reported missing as presumed dead.

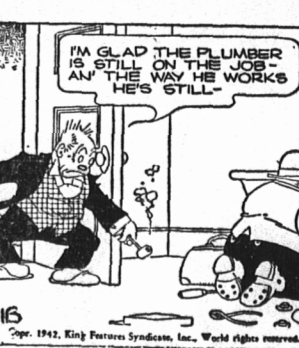
