



IN MEMORIAM

MRS. JAMES C. HUDSON.

The community of Casumpec was saddened when it became known that one of its most loved and respected citizens had passed to her reward in the person of Mrs. Margaret Hudson, whose death took place at her home there, on Sunday morning, April 24th, after only a week's illness of that dread disease, pneumonia. She was a daughter of the late William Cameron and was born in Tryon, P. E. I., in 1856, but has been a resident of Casumpec since her marriage about 50 years ago. The late Mrs. Hudson possessed a kind, cheerful and sympathetic disposition, which endeared her to all with whom she mingled. Her absence will be keenly felt, not only in the home, but in the church and community as well, for she was prominent in every good work. She will be even more keenly missed because the end came so unexpectedly. Except for a touch of rheumatism, she was unusually well, active and broad in her interests for one of her years. She was chosen president of the Casumpec Auxiliary of the W. M. S., which was organized a few months ago, and was very enthusiastic in this work. Indeed, her memory will be an inspiration to the members of the Society to urge them on to greater effort. There are left to mourn their irreparable loss two daughters, Mrs. Robert Rankin, Summerside, and Mrs. (Rev.) W. J. Dornville, Bellefleur, N.B.; and one son, Brenton, with whom she resided on the homestead; also thirteen grandchildren. To all of these the heartfelt sympathy of the community is extended. Her husband, the late James C. Hudson, predeceased her thirteen years ago.

The funeral service was held in Casumpec United Church, on Tuesday afternoon, April 26th, when a large number of relatives and friends assembled to pay their last tribute of respect. The floral offerings from loved ones and friends were very beautiful, the tribute from the W. M. S. being a dainty crescent of daffodils. The service was conducted by the pastor, Rev. A. S. Weir, who, in the course of his address made fitting reference to the life and character of the departed, and spoke words of comfort to the sorrowing family, who mourn "not as those who have no hope." The pall-bearers were Messrs. Major Carruthers, R. E. Rayner, J. H. Bryan, M. I. Gordon, Frank Brundage and H. R. Lockerby. The remains were lovingly laid to rest in Casumpec cemetery beside those of her husband.

After an illness of several weeks duration, Miss Jessie Scott, of 29 Alley St., Charlottetown, passed to her Eternal Home. She was born in Cornwall, P. E. I., in the year 1842 and spent the early years of her life in that community. In the year 1871 she went to the United States where she resided until 1888, at which time she returned to live with her brother, Mr. Jacob Scott, who survives her. Early in life she united with the Baptist Church and was always a consistent member and earnest supporter of every Christian enterprise with which she came in contact. On account of her quiet, unassuming manner of life, her many gifts and deeds of Christian love are not known. She was a woman of sterling character, of

strong faith and kindly disposition.

Several weeks ago she showed signs of failing health, and on Wednesday morning, April 27th, she entered into rest at the mature age of 85.

The funeral service was held at the home on Friday, April 29th, conducted by Rev. Ross C. Eaton. The singing of appropriate hymns, a solo by Mrs. Leigh Warren, and a few fitting remarks from the text "Blessed are the dead, which die in the Lord" marked a quiet impressive service. The burial took place in Cornwall cemetery.

It is our sad duty to record the passing of one of the most prominent and active members of Kellys Cross parish, the late Patrick Trainor, carriage builder, and general carpenter, in his 55th year.

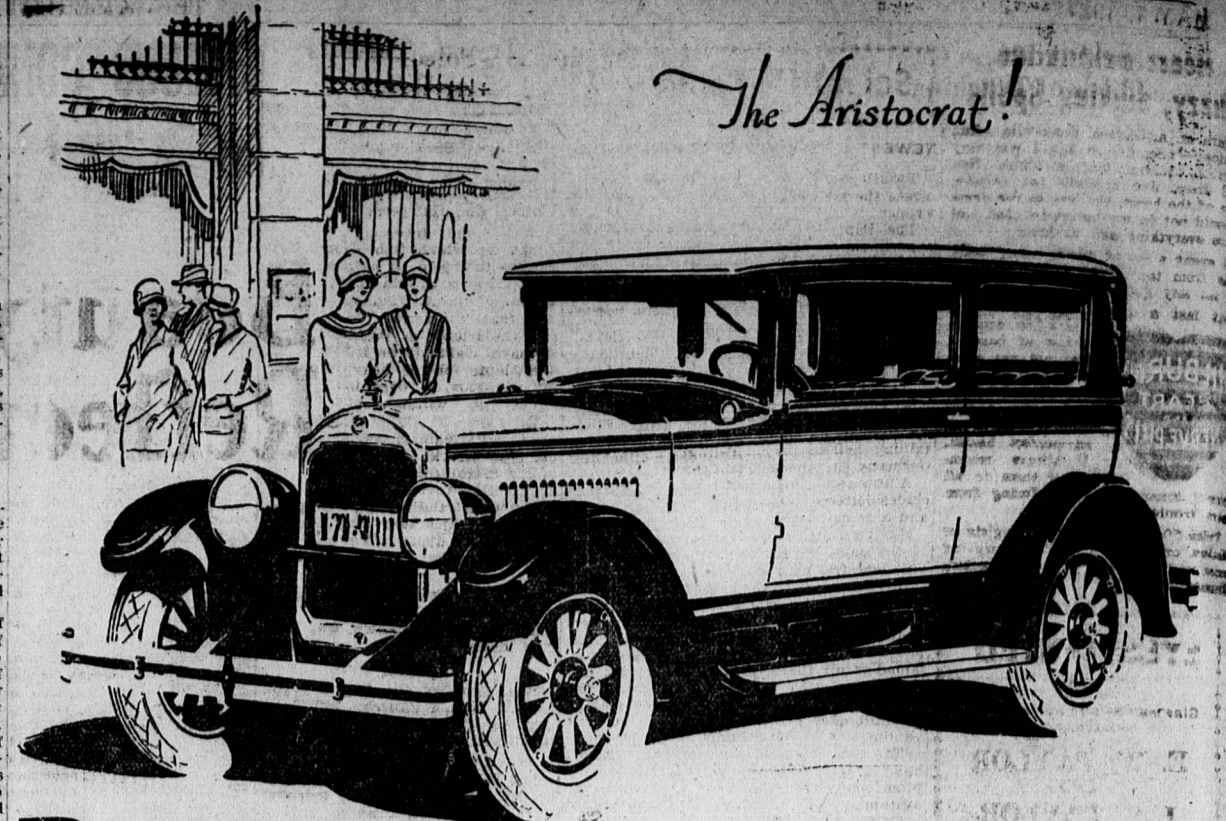
It certainly exemplifies the axiom that "in the midst of life we are in death," for Mr. Trainor, up to one week prior to the date of his death, the 21st of April, was at work on wheels he was making for some of his customers, and stuck to the job till its completion. On that night he was feeling not as usual, but despite that indisposition, and true to the precepts of the Church of which he was an exemplary member, and true to the precepts of his own faith, which he ever consistently followed, he walked to church the next morning—Holy Thursday—and during Mass had the ineffable joy of receiving Holy Communion. This was his last visit to his beloved old St. Joseph's church, which he had viewed and admired in his workshop for the last 40 or 50 years. He certainly has an example by his industry and thrift in material affairs, and a practical concrete one in performing the duties enjoined by the Catholic church, which our younger men should emulate.

The funeral took place on Saturday morning 23rd April, owing to conditions of the road, the distance from the home to the church being about a quarter of a mile the following young men kindly bore the remains to the church—Joseph Kelly, S. Monaghan, F. Bradley, O. Kelly, Horace Trainor, Jno. McQuaid, J. A. McDonald, A. Malone.

The deceased, who has been a lifelong resident of Kellys Cross, will leave a vacancy in the industrial life of the community, in the religious and family circles, where he was always found at his post, his presence will be sadly missed, for he was the centre and the idol of his family who looked to him for encouragement and example, and they were never disappointed, and at his passing, he has bequeathed to his family what is better than all the gold in the world, the example of a stainless, pure life, sobriety, industry and the priceless heritage of the Catholic faith.
