LORDS AND COMMONS IN CONFLICT.

The House of Lords the other day gave a majority of 200 against a principal feature of the Government Education Bill. The Anglican peers, led by the Archbishop of Canterbury, twenty bishops and the Duke of Devonshire were supported in this by the Roman Catholic peers under the Marquis of Bute. The differences between the Lords and Commons on this question seem impossible to be bridged over, but there are other like differences in prospect.

The Bannerman Administration seem disposed to take up the question of Home Rule for Ireland, and should this be done there is little doubt that the Lords would again block the way, as they did in Mr. Gladstone's time, the more especially as subsequent elections gave popular approval to their rejection of that measure. Another probable ground for conflict exists in regard to labor legislation. With fifty odd labor representatives in the ministerial ranks in the Commons the Government will go far to give them what they want, and the Lords, representing the employing class, are almost certain to oppose such a proposition.

It is quite within the bounds of possibility that the majorities of the two Houses may be thus found in conflict. In regard to three principal government measures in succession. And what then? Possibly a fresh appeal to the country. Almost certainly a strong effort to array the popular feeling against the House of Lords, and a repetition of the cry, "Mend it or end it." We know with what obstreperous energy that cry was raised in past years, and with how little effect. The venerable aristocratic Chamber has not as yet been either mended or ended. And yet sometime the hereditary Chamber will become a thing of the past, an event that cannot but be hastened by persistent defiance of the popular will.

ONE CENTRAL PRISON.

That only one jail is needed for this Province is a conviction growing in many minds. Our total population is small and the percentage of population that is criminal is the smallest of any Province of Canada. It has happened that all our jails were empty. There is therefore no need for a provincial prison in each county. Moreover the jail at Summerside and the building which serves for a prison in Charlottetown has long been of little value, and its appearance and location make it an eyesore.

With new jails needed for Queens and Prince Counties, the suggestion to build one prison for the entire Province is a timely one. One building can be maintained at much less cost than the three or four heretofore existing and the salaries of the keepers in the outlying institutions can be saved. Easy and prompt communication by rail with all parts of the Province has created entirely different conditions from those existing before the days of railways. One central prison, with police lockups in the other principal centres would be ample for present needs. We trust the Provincial Government will consider the matter in this light before undertaking to rebuild or create new jails for the separate counties.

ELECTION PETITIONS IN SASKATCHEWAN.

The first election for the new Saskatchewan Legislature was said to be fruitful of illegality and corruption. It was certainly fruitful of election petitions. Sixteen of these petitions were filed, one of which was against the return of Hon. J. H. Lamont, Attorney General and member elect for Prince Albert City. The case was first heard by Justice Prendergast, who dismissed the petition on the ground that the Controverted Elections Act is not in force in Saskatchewan. The case was quite naturally appealed to the full Court, which by four Judges to two upheld Judge Prendergast's decision. If this is sound law, all the petitions growing out of the late election in Saskatchewan must fail.

The whole matter turned upon whether the Controverted Elections Act of the Northwest Territories is or is not in force in the new Province. There can be little doubt that the Parliament of Canada intended it to apply. The federal statute creating the Province of Saskatchewan declares that until its Legislature otherwise provides, "the law with regard to the constitution of the Legislative Assembly of the Northwest Territories and the election of members thereof shall apply, mutatis mutandis to the Legislative Assembly of the said Province and the election of members thereof respectively." Under this Act the majority of the Judges held that the law respecting elections was in full force, but the law respecting controverted elections was not in force.

Such things are confusing to the lay mind. The Judges first assume that a controverted election is not an election, and thereupon summarily decide that there can be no controverted elections. The decision of the Supreme Court of Saskatchewan is the more open to question because of the fact that the Chief Justice and his associates who make up the majority of the full court were formerly Liberal politicians and were appointed to their present positions by the Liberal Government while the dissenting Judges were appointed by a Conservative Government.

A PHILIPPINE PARLIAMENT.

It is officially announced that President Roosevelt will soon direct the calling of an election in the civilized portion of the Philippine Islands. But it will be too much like the Czar's Donnas to please the Filipinos. There will be two Houses

the upper one to be appointed from Washington, and as all laws must pass both Houses, and as the Government will be in no way responsible to the popular Chamber, it is clear that the representative institutions, so-called will be very imperfect and primitive. Still it will be a step in that direction, and perhaps quite as long a step as might be thought advisable at the present time. The last of the many successive insurrections has but recently been quelled, and the educational status of the masses in the islands is yet hardly sufficient to qualify them for full self-government.

There is much public inquiry to know why a commitment has not been placed with the proper officers to send to jail a notorious offender against the Prohibitory Law who has been convicted of a fourth offense. It is quite useless to make convictions, or to lay informations, or for that matter, to enact laws,—if this course is to be pursued. We shall return to the subject.

Boston Herald: The charge against Mrs. Eddy appears to be that at 85 she is not as young as she once was; that she maintains a degree of privacy which is not yet a crime in any lady, and that she has not made public accounting of the earnings of her pen.
