DOMINION DAY.

Tomorrow our fair Dominion will have attained the age of thirty three years—almost a third part of a century—and by general consent Canadian's will celebrate the anniversary as an auspicious one. The wisest statesmen of British North America joined together to bring about the union of the Provinces under a free constitution and under the shelter of the Imperial flag and Government. Their work stands well approved by a later generation than that in which they labored. Most of the Fathers of Confederation have rested from their toils, but the fabric of which they laid the foundation stands as a noble monument to their statesmanship and forecast.

It was midway in the longest and most glorious reign in British history that this Union was brought about. It was in a decade in which political earthquakes of unprecedented magnitude and severity shook both the New World and the Old. Just before the advent of the Dominion North America trembled beneath the tread of millions of armed men in the Republic beside us, and there the hoary iniquity of human slavery was crushed out for ever. Just after the natal day of the Dominion Imperial France was prostrated beneath the swift onset of the German legions, and the Napoleonic dynasty ceased to exist. It was in the midst of such stirring events that this new nation of freemen, uncorrupted by the taint of slavery, unshaken by the purple splendors of despotism, shaped for themselves a constitution containing all the guarantees

of liberty, equality and justice.

As we have said, the work of the Fathers of Confederation stands approved and abundantly justified by the results. No people on earth possess a larger measure of liberty, a better form of government, juster laws, a nobler heritage, or are more content with their lot. Beginning with four Provinces in 1867, our national boundaries were pushed westward to the Rocky Mountains in 1870; to the far off Pacific in 1871; encircled this fair Island in 1873, and have since been pushed northward to the Arctic Ocean. We have half a continent for our possession, richly dowered with the treasures of the soil, the forest, the mine and the sea. Nor have we left it unimproved. An energetic and progressive people have belted it with bands of steel from the Atlantic to the Pacific and netted it with electric wires; connected lake with lake by costly channels for commerce; redeemed the wilderness to the plow and the sickle; built cities, churches, schools and colleges; established great and fruitful industries and covered the oceans with our commerce.

In all these years, beneath the smile of Heaven, we have enjoyed peace and plenty. No conqueror has invaded or threatened us; no great national calamity has befallen us; nor plague nor famine has visited us. And within, in the midst of outward prosperity, increasing wealth, expanding commerce, busy industries and a full treasury, the national spirit has grown. To day, more than ever before, every citizen of the Dominion is proud of his country, proud of the name Canadian, and proud and loyal as a citizen of the Great British Empire. Therefore we do well to celebrate with heart and voice the recurrence of our national anniversary, Dominion Day.

According to the Examiner the Prohibitory Law, which forbids the liquor traffic on all days and at all hours is "a fraudulent humbug." At the same time it eagerly informs the liquor sellers of a hole which it claims to have discovered in the License Law by which they can sell all night if they wish. It is clearly doing its utmost to make the bounds of license wider than they were supposed to be. What would a farmer think of a neighbor who would direct lawless cattle toward a weak spot in his fence? The Examiner denounces prohibition with one breath and with the next asks the liquor sellers, Why don't you sell all night? Such love for temperance is very easily understood.

We read that the Boers are disgusted that Kruger has fled and taken all the public money with him. They begin to see that his real object is to get safely out of the country, taking the gold with him and leaving them to shift for themselves. Deputations of Boers are calling upon him to surrender, but the selfish old man has little intention of doing so. If he can get away with the gold he will do so.

As Dominion Day falls this year on Sunday, next Monday will be observed as a public holiday and in consequence THE MORNING GUARDIAN will not be issued on that day.

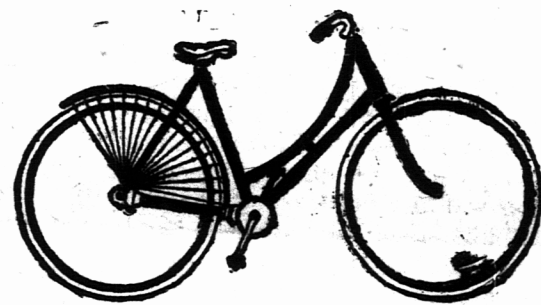
